admission and registration

Visiting the School

Registration

Applications for entry to Abingdon should be made using the registration form that is sent out with the prospectus or is available from www.abingdon.org.uk/registration_form or email: admissions@abingdon.org.uk

The completed registration form, and a cheque for the non-refundable fee, should be returned to the Admissions Registrar at the School. Please see the Fees section in this booklet for the current registration fee.

An overview of the main entry points to the School

The main points of entry are at age 11 (First Year), age 13 (Third Year) and age 16 (Sixth Form). Candidates slightly older or younger may be accepted at these points of entry at the Head's discretion; each case is considered on its merits.

There is no regular entry at other ages, but occasional vacancies arise at age 12 (Second Year) and age 14 (Fourth Year) and the Admissions Registrar will consider applications for these specific age groups.

We have boarding (both weekly and full) from the age of 13.

Overseas admissions are usually considered on an individual basis and age variations can be more likely. For more information about overseas admissions please visit www.abingdon.org.uk/overseas_admissions. Please ask the Admissions Registrar if you are unsure about which year of entry to apply for.

Boys are selected for entry by competitive examination, but consideration is also given to character and non-academic attainments or interests. To avoid unnecessary disappointment, every case is investigated as carefully as possible beforehand, and advice is given accordingly; it is sensible, therefore, for parents to register their sons well in advance of the admission point.

The admissions procedures described in this booklet may be subject to minor changes from time to time.

Abingdon Preparatory School

Abingdon Preparatory School has 250 pupils aged between 4 and 13. The Preparatory School is located in 50 acres of beautiful grounds about 10 minutes from the Senior School. Main entry to the Preparatory School is at age 4+ and 7+. Further information can be obtained from: www.abingdon.org.uk/prep or email registrar@abingdonprep.org.uk or by calling 01865 391570.

First year entry (age 11)

Details of the First Year entry procedure are listed below. The key dates for First Year entry are available on our website www.abingdon.org.uk/first_year_admission/#key_dates

Application

First Year boys are usually aged 11 on 1 September of their year of entry. First Year entry is intended for boys who would normally transfer from their primary school (or equivalent) on completion of Year 6 (UK national

curriculum). For this entry point, we recommend that prospective pupils are registered before October in the academic year prior to joining.

The Assessment Process

The offer of a place in the First Year is made on the basis of a candidate's performance in the entrance test, a confidential report from his current school and an interview. Details of the arrangements for the entry test are sent to the parents of all registered candidates in the previous October (or on registration for late registrations). The School does not send out copies of past examination papers, but does send sample questions.

The tests

Candidates sit an entrance test in early January with papers in English. Mathematics and Reasoning. These papers are designed to be appropriate for candidates from primary schools as well as independent schools. There are two English papers. The first paper (45 mins) tests boys' reading skills by asking them to respond to two prose passages via multiple choice questions. Also in this paper are some questions testing grammar and spelling as well as facility with manipulating words. The second paper (30 mins) asks for a composition, and assesses boys' writing skills. Boys will have the option to write descriptive, narrative or discursive writing according to where they feel they are strongest. The mathematics paper (50 mins) contains questions on such topics as fractions, decimals, averages, percentages, coordinates, sequences, perimeters, areas, nets, currency and ratios. Metric units will be used throughout and calculators are not allowed. The reasoning paper (3 sections, 45mins in total) tests verbal, numerical and pattern skills, and each test section is preceded by a set of 6 practice questions. The reasoning test is conducted on computers; the English and Maths exams are on paper. Candidates are not required to wear school uniform. Lunch and snacks are provided.

Interviews

Candidates are selected for interview at the School following the written papers. The interview is a friendly affair, providing the School with an opportunity to get to know a candidate's personality and interests outside the classroom. The School is happy for candidates to bring something with them, such as an object of interest or an example of their work, to provide talking points. Under certain circumstances some candidates may be asked to attend a second interview.

Results

Offers of places are usually sent out about three weeks after the written examination. Parents will be asked to give a firm acceptance of the place and to pay a deposit which will be credited to the parents' final account when their son leaves the School

Induction

Successful candidates are invited to the School for two induction days, one in June and the second in September.

First year awards

There are two main categories of award available to boys joining the First Year:

- John Roysse academic awards a number of these are made for the
 two years of the Lower School to reward outstanding performance in the
 entrance tests and interviews. John Roysse academic award winners
 are eligible to sit the academic scholarship examination two years later.
- Griffen awards a number of these are made for the duration of Lower School to boys considered exceptional all-rounders as they emerge through the admissions process.

In addition Lower School candidates may also be considered for:

- Head's awards a number of awards made at the discretion of the Head in recognition of a particular strength or talent.
- Music exhibitions up to two awards are available for the duration of Lower School.

There is no separate application required for the academic, Griffen and Head's awards. There is however an application process for potential music exhibitioners. Further details are available from the school website. www.abingdon.org.uk/music scholarships

Third year entry (age 13)

Application

Third Year boys are usually aged 13 on 1 September in the year of entry.

For Third Year entry, it is helpful if boys are registered with us by the

Procedure

Listed below are the three main methods of entry to the Third Year. Prior to sitting one of these sets of examinations boys should take a pre-test. This usually takes place about two years before a candidate is planning to join the School (UK national curriculum Year 7). A conditional offer of a place in the Third Year is made on the basis of a candidate's performance in the pre-test, a confidential report from his current school and an interview. Places are then confirmed following a satisfactory performance in one of the following examinations (taken in Year 8 of the UK national curriculum).

- Common Entrance: this examination, which is set externally by the Independent Schools' Examinations Board, is taken by boys attending independent prep schools in the June preceding the September of entry.
- 13+ examination: Abingdon's own examination which is taken in the spring preceding the September of entry by those attending maintained schools, some UK independent schools and schools overseas. This examination consists of papers in English (reading comprehension and an essay), mathematics and reasoning. Candidates will also be expected to prepare for interviews in their modern language or languages, the sciences and a general interview. In addition we will ask a pupil's current school to supply a confidential report.
- Academic scholarship: this examination is taken in early March preceding the September of entry (see further information in the Third Year Scholarships section). If you have any queries about scholarship entry please contact the Admissions Registrar.

The pre-test process

Candidates sit the pre-test in late October of Year 7 (UK national curriculum year group) with papers in English, Mathematics and Reasoning. Details of the arrangements are sent to the parents of all registered candidates in the previous May (or on registration for those registering later than this). The School does not send out copies of past examination papers, but does send sample questions. The papers are designed to be appropriate for anyone in a school which has an eye on the UK National Curriculum, whether the school be an independent or not. There are two English papers. The first paper (45 mins) tests boys' reading skills by asking them to respond to two prose passages via multiple choice questions. Also in this paper are some questions testing grammar and spelling as well as facility with manipulating words. The second paper (30 mins) asks for a composition, and assesses boys' writing skills. Boys will have the option to write descriptive, narrative or discursive writing according to where they feel

they are strongest. The mathematics paper (50 mins) contains questions on such topics as fractions, decimals, averages, percentages, coordinates, sequences, perimeters, areas, nets, currency and ratios. Metric units will be used throughout and calculators are not allowed. The reasoning paper (3 sections, 45mins in total) tests verbal, numerical and pattern skills, and each test section is preceded by a set of 6 practice questions. The reasoning test is conducted on computers; the English and Maths exams are on paper. Candidates are not required to wear school uniform. Lunch and snacks are provided.

Interviews

Candidates are selected for interview at the School following the written papers. The interview is a friendly affair, providing the School with an opportunity to get to know a candidate's personality and interests outside the classroom. The School is happy for candidates to bring something with them, such as an object of interest or an example of their work, to provide talking points. Under certain circumstances some candidates may be asked to attend a second interview.

Results

Following the interview, successful candidates will be offered a place, subject only to a satisfactory result in Common Entrance, the academic scholarship or the 13+ transfer examination. Parents will be asked to give a firm acceptance of the place and to pay a deposit which will be credited to the parents' final account when their son leaves the School. We expect candidates to reach the required standard in their qualifying examination (as detailed above) but if this is not the case, the deposit will be returned.

Late applications

The School will view sympathetically later applications from parents, such as those who move into the area after the pre-test period, provided that places are still available.

Induction

In late June, following the Common Entrance examination, the confirmed Third Year entrants are invited to the School for an induction day.

Third year scholarships

The majority of Abingdon School scholarships and exhibitions are awarded to boys entering the Third Year.

- Academic: Between 15 and 18 academic scholarships are awarded at
 Third Year entry. Academic scholarships to the Middle School are
 offered on the results of the academic scholarship examination held in
 early March each year. The examination, taken by both internal and
 external candidates instead of Common Entrance, extends over three
 days. It consists of an interview and papers in English, Mathematics,
 French or German, Science, Latin, and Humanities (History, Geography
 and Religious Studies). There is also a general paper. Some pupils
 take examinations in extra subjects.
- Art and Design Technology: Up to four art and design awards are made after examination of project work, a practical examination and an interview.
- Music: A flexible number of music scholarships, including free tuition on up to three instruments. We also offer instrumental exhibitions giving free tuition on one or two instruments. Music awards are based on auditions on at least two instruments.
- Sport: Up to four sports awards are available for outstanding candidates
- Drama: Up to four drama awards are available for outstanding candidates.

Both sports and drama awards are made on the strength of an assessment of appropriate skills and achievements in a practical session and at interview.

Sixth form entry

We welcome applications from boys attending a very wide variety of schools ranging from the local independent and maintained sector schools to those attending schools abroad. The sixth form admissions process takes place between November and early March of the year immediately preceding entry. Listed below are the details of the sixth form entry procedure. The key dates for sixth form entry are available on the website www.abingdon.org.uk/sixth_form_admission/#key_dates

Application

Sixth form boys are usually aged 16 on 1 September in the year of entry. Boys who are older or younger maybe considered on an individual basis. As far as possible boys should be registered by December in the year prior to entry.

Procedure

- Following registration, candidates will be asked to provide information about their choice of A level subjects.
- The Sixth Form Open Evening in October gives candidates an opportunity to discuss the sixth form curriculum at Abingdon and A level subject choice before the assessments take place. Booking for this event is recommended, please visit www.abingdon.org.uk/visit_abingdon
- We will also ask a boy's current school for a reference.
- Academic assessments and interviews take place from November.
 However most locally based candidates, including those wishing to
 sit our academic sixth form scholarship, attend their interviews and
 assessments in the Lent term (late February or early March). Please
 feel free to contact the Admissions Registrar to discuss dates for
 assessment.
- Candidates will have an interview with the Upper Master or a member of senior academic staff as well as at least one subject interview.
 Candidates whose first language is not English will usually be interviewed by our Head of English as a Foreign Language, EFL.
- Candidates will be offered places based on the results of their
 interviews and assessments, and in the case of those taking GCSEs,
 the strength of their predicted grades. For those taking GCSEs, it is
 recommended that boys achieve A grades in the subjects chosen for
 A level study and there is a minimum overall requirement for entry into
 the Sixth Form of three A grades and four B grades. Please contact
 the Admissions Registrar for further information.
- Overseas candidates may take their examination papers overseas by prior arrangement and papers may be sent from November onwards. Interviews for overseas candidates may also be conducted using Skype or a similar medium. However we always encourage candidates to visit the School if at all possible and we do reserve the right to ask individuals to attend the School for assessment when it is considered necessary.

Sixth form scholarships

- Academic: Sixth form academic scholarships may be awarded on entry
 to the School from other schools, the scholarship examinations being
 held in November (overseas) and early March. Candidates
 will sit papers in at least two of the subjects they intend to study
 at A level, together with a general paper and reasoning paper.
 There will also be subject interviews and a general interview.
 Please contact the Admissions Registrar or Master of Scholars for more
 information
- Art and Design Technology: Art and design technology scholarships are made after examination of project work, a practical examination and an interview.
- Music: A flexible number of music scholarships, including free tuition on up to three instruments. We also offer instrumental exhibitions giving free tuition on one or two instruments. Music awards are based on auditions on at least two instruments.
- · Sports awards for outstanding candidates.
- Drama awards for outstanding candidates.

Both sports and drama awards are made on the strength of an assessment of appropriate skills and achievements in a practical session and at interview.

Financial Assistance through Scholarships and Bursaries

Scholarships and other similar awards carry a nominal financial reward. In the Lower School, entry at age 11, the Academic and Griffen awards carry an entitlement to a nominal fee remission of £300 per annum. Music exhibitions provide free tuition on one (or occasionally two) instruments.

In Middle and Upper School all scholarships carry an entitlement to a nominal fee remission of £300 per annum. Music scholarships offer free tuition on up to three instruments and music exhibitions offer free tuition on one or two instruments. In addition, for all scholarships and awards, there is an option to apply for further financial assistance through a means-tested bursary (dependent on parental need) and this can be up to 100% of fees.

Tenure of awards is conditional upon continued good work and behaviour. Further details on all these scholarships are available from the website. www.abingdon.org.uk/scholarships

Fees and conditions

School fees are payable termly in advance. The fees include the provision of textbooks but not the cost of major travel items such as exchanges, ski trips and field courses. An extra charge is made for daily transport on the school coaches. Full details on current charges are available from the school website www.abingdon.org.uk/joint_bus_service. It is the parents' responsibility to get their sons to school. All pupils are expected to attend school lunch each day and the cost is included in the tuition fee.

The Governors endeavour to restrict fee increases, such increases being normally effective from September. Fees are due to be paid before the first day of each term except when payment by Direct Debit instalments is agreed. The Governors reserve the right to charge interest on fees that are overdue.

Except for pupils leaving the upper sixth in July, at least a full term's notice of leaving must be given in writing. If such notice is not provided, the Governors reserve the right to charge a full term's fee. Similarly, a full term's notice in writing is expected if instrumental music tuition is to be discontinued or a place on a school bus is no longer required.

Financial assistance with fees

Bursaries may be awarded on entry to the School at age 11, 13 or 16 and can be up to 100% of fees. All bursaries are means-tested.

In some circumstances bursary funds are available for parents of boys already in the School who have temporary and unexpected financial difficulties. Priority will be given to those approaching a critical time in their education, such as GCSEs or A levels, and assistance would not normally be given for more than two terms.

general information

Health

The Health Centre State Registered Nurse, is on duty during the school week. The School Medical Officer or a partner in his GP practice is always available, in addition to his regular surgery visits. Full boarding pupils needing medical treatment at school are cared for in the Health Centre. We expect weekly boarding and day boys, who fall ill, to go home.

When a boarder requires special medical treatment, the School will make every effort to obtain the prior consent of a parent or guardian, or of the pupil himself, if he is over sixteen. Should this be impossible, the Head or housemaster, acting in loco parentis, is authorised to consent to whatever treatment (including anaesthetic or operation) a doctor or consultant recommends.






Travelling from the North or South on the A34


- Exit the A34 at the Marcham Interchange with the A415 following signs for Abingdon and Town Centre.
- Proceed for approximately one mile crossing three small roundabouts.
 Abingdon School is signposted, turning left into Conduit Road.
- At the crossroads with Park Road turn right. The main driveway to the school is on your left. Visitors' parking is opposite this main driveway on your right.

Travelling from Dorchester-on-Thames on the A415

- Cross the River Thames bridge and turn left at the Market Place into the High Street.
- Keep to the left-hand lane and carry straight on following signs for Wantage, Newbury and the A34.
- Abingdon School is signposted, turning right into Conduit Road.
