ON TOP OF THE WORLD

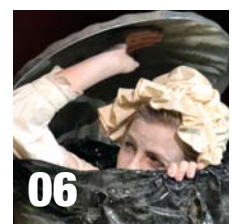

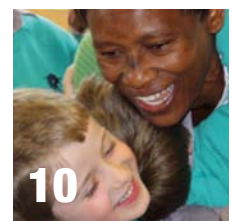

Governor Profile: Sir Vivian Ramsey



Having read Engineering Science and Economics at Oxford, Sir Vivian Ramsey OA 1968, began his career as a Civil Engineer. He later took the Diploma of Law course at City University and then read for the Bar, where he established an expertise in construction and engineering disputes, which took him all over the world. Appointed to the High Court in the Queen's Bench Division in 2005, he is a Judge in the Technology and Construction Court. He received a knighthood in 2007.

Sir Vivian joined the Abingdon Governing Body in 2009 and sits on the Finance and General Purposes Committee. Married with four children, his interests include vineyards and the renovation of buildings. He is the son of the Right Reverend Ian Ramsey onetime Bishop of Durham and the first chairman of TASS – The Abingdon School Society – which was the forerunner of the present ASPA – Abingdon School Parents' Association. ■

Sir Vivian will host the Professional Networking Legal Dinner on Friday 7 October at the School.

Di Bloomfield



Di Bloomfield, who has been a familiar face about the School for thirty-four years, retired at the end of last term. She first started work at Abingdon in 1977, after ten years as a cleaner she was appointed assistant housekeeper, and twelve years later head housekeeper. When asked recently what the job has entailed she laughed and said anything and everything, whatever she's been asked to do.

Things have changed and the School has grown in both numbers and buildings, thirty-four years ago there were six cleaners on the staff, now there are more than forty, including those in the boarding houses. However, Di says that it has always been a happy place to work, helped by having a great team.

Born and brought up in Abingdon, working at the School has been something of a family affair – both Di's mother-in-law and father-in-law worked here, as do two of her brothers.

The mother of two and grandmother of six, Di does not envisage a quiet retirement but she's looking forward to being free to do whatever she wants to do. ■

Exam Results

Despite the trepidation with which they approached their results, Abingdon boys had nothing to fear: 65% of all A levels were at grades A* and A, and 20 boys achieved 3 A*s or more. At GCSE, 81% of all results were at grades A* and A, two boys achieved 12 A*s each and 17 boys 10 A*s or more. The Head, Felicity Lusk, spoke for the whole School when she expressed her pride in their performances and offered her congratulations to the boys, their families and the staff.

Remembering War

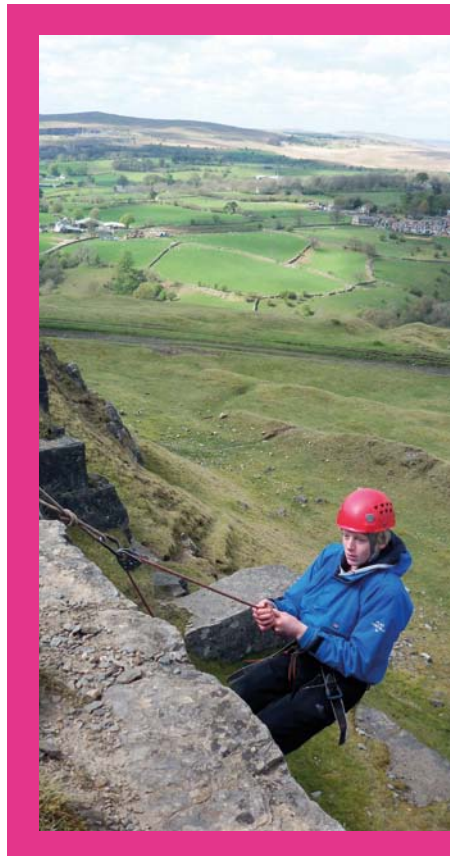

Abingdon's First Orchestra and Big Band spent ten days in America over the Easter holidays performing in four East Coast cities – Boston, Worcester, New York and Washington. The tour culminated in a huge concert in Washington National Cathedral joining with musicians from St Alban's, the Washington National Cathedral School and two other visiting schools from Manhattan. Charlie Hall played Bruch's *Violin Concerto*, Osman Tack Saint-Saëns *Piano Concerto* and Humphrey Thompson sang Mozart's *Non Plu Andrai*. For the finale a massed chorus of 250 voices sang the two national anthems, Parry's *I was Glad*, *Jerusalem* and Patrick Doyle's *Non Nobis Domine* – a thrilling finale to an exciting tour that earned the musicians several standing ovations. ■

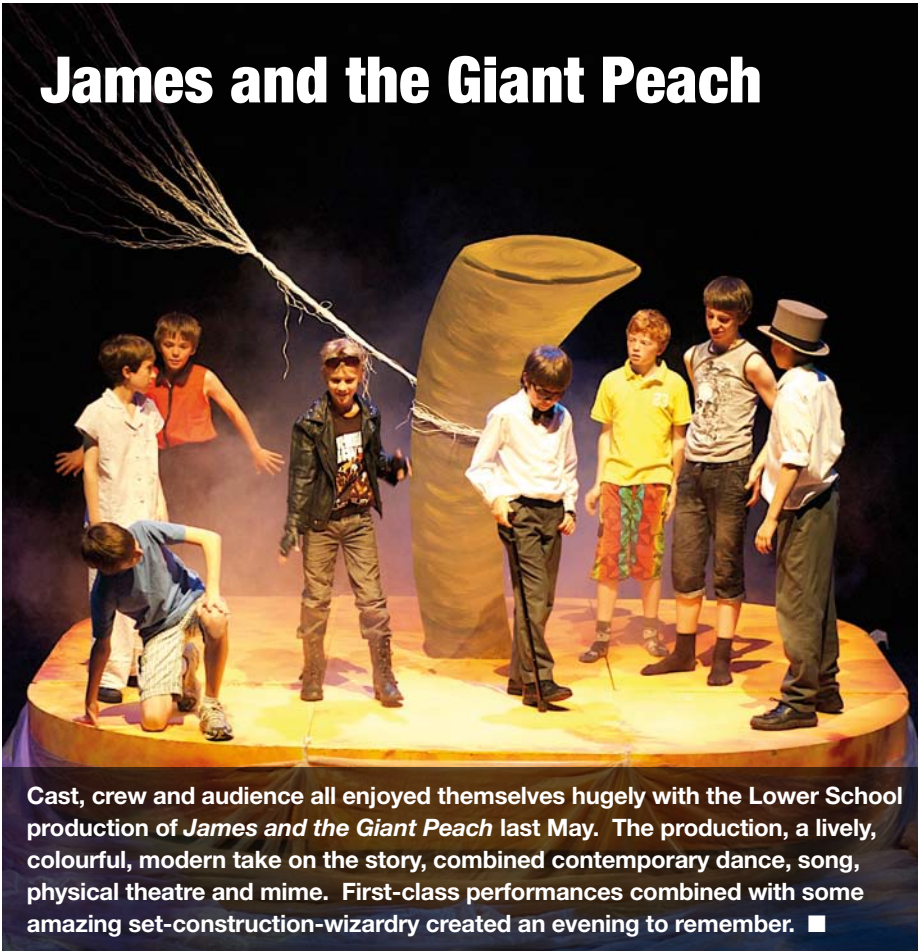


Overtures and Finales

Awesome Oarsmen



It was silver Saturday at the National Schools' Championships in May when silver medals went to the J14As in the Octuples, the J16A VIII - beaten by just 0.19 seconds – the J16 coxless IV and the 1st and 2nd VIIIs. The gold medals came on Sunday when the coxless pair won the Committee's Cup and the coxless IV – in the premier event of the day – won the Royal Engineers' Cup. In the run-up to Henley, the 1st VIII won the Foster Cup at the Metropolitan Regatta and then the Grand Challenge Cup at Reading Regatta. At Henley the crew put in spectacular performances to beat St Edward's in the quarter-final, Radley in the semi-final and St Andrew's School USA in the final of the Princess Elizabeth Cup, the premier rowing award for boys' schools, which Abingdon last won in 2002. ■

Representing GB

Abingdon rowers have been representing GB at a number of international events over the summer. There were four Abingdonians in GB crews at the Munich International Junior Regatta where Jamie Copus and Felix Newman achieved a magnificent second place in their pairs event, as did the GB VIII with two Abingdonians in the crew – Will Davey and Vassilis Ragoussis. Abingdon's J16A coxed IV, rowing for GB, achieved a clear win over the French crew at the annual GB v France match. At the Coup de la Jeunesse in July, Will Davey rowed in the coxless IV, winning silver on the Saturday and gold on the Sunday, and Neil McKenzie coxed both the coxed IV and the VIII, winning silver and bronze on the Saturday and gold and gold on the Sunday. ■

Athletics

In an amazing result at the Radley Medley Relays on 3 May, Abingdon tied for first place with Harrow, both teams achieving a time of 3.51. Two days later at the Achilles Relays the 4 x 800m team led throughout the race to cross the line nearly 10 seconds ahead of the team in second place. At the Oxfordshire County Athletics Championships Peter Barnshaw won the 400m and 110m hurdles and came second in the 100m, 200m, and 400m. Later in the term Peter won the Midland Counties Under 18 Decathlon Championships. ■

County Cricket Champions

Two Abingdon teams became county cricket champions this summer. The U15s beat Bartholomew School comfortably to win the title, having already defeated Lord William's School, Thame and Magdalen College School on their way to the final. The U14s met Lord William's in the final of the Lord's Taverners' Cricket Colts Trophy. Abingdon were 199 for 5 from their 30 overs, Lord William's were all out for 124. ■

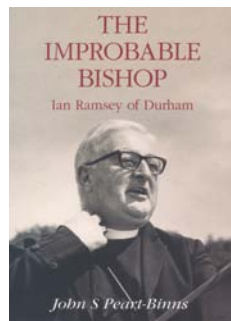
Cruising Along!

Annual Fund Achieves Record Income

This year's annual fund has exceeded all expectations raising over £90,000 by the end of the Summer term. This is the highest total achieved since the inception of the fund four years ago and is a wonderful testament to the generosity of the School's close-knit community who, even in these less than certain economic times, have shown amazing support.

40% of the funds raised were in support of the Chapel window scheme and we are now very close to our appeal total. 20% of the funds were donated to the School to use them where it needs them most (unrestricted funds) and other areas supported included boarding, the archives, biology, bursaries, CCF, Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme, ICT, music, careers, rowing and sport.

The funds donated to specific areas will be allocated to the appropriate departments at the end of the School's financial year in August and we will report on how those have been spent at a later date. Unrestricted funds are now allocated by a Development Fund Committee, which considers requests from all areas of the School based on the criteria that they will provide exceptional added value to the boys and that the items cannot be funded from within existing departmental budgets.



The approved requests included:

- CCF and Duke of Edinburgh Awards Scheme – a trailer for kit ensuring double the number of boys can travel on trips
- Chinese – a high-definition multimedia document camera
- Classics - an Oxford Latin Dictionary and Greek Lexicon
- Economics – a high definition webcam
- Modern Foreign Languages – digital video recorders for motivating boys to develop oral work
- Physics – a high-resolution digital spectrometer to enhance teaching and learning about spectroscopy
- Shooting – electronic targets and scopes allowing more time for activity
- Rugby – a match scoreboard and a squat rack for training (also benefits other sports)
- Art – a tabletop potters' wheel
- English – funding for visiting speakers and a writer-in-residence
- Grounds – wooden benches for the Jekyll garden providing quiet areas for boys. ■



The Return of Football

Football will return this term as a full sports option after an absence of 83 years. The game was being played at the School in 1890 when the first edition of *The Abingdonian* was published, but in 1922 it was replaced by hockey in the Lent term, and in 1928 by rugby in the Michaelmas term. In the early days, reports in *The Abingdonian* were much blunter than we would expect to see today: of a goalkeeper, "it would be better if he were taller and not so self-confident", and of a back that he was "too small to occupy the post with any great success." There were constant references to the old-fashioned quality 'pluck', mixed with such timeless advice as "a match is never over until time is called". The footballers wore cerise shirts with white sleeves and the caps were half cerise and half white – the rugby players originally wore yellow and black. ■

100 Years Ago – plus ça change?

The minute book of the Abingdon School Literary, Scientific and Debating Society has recently come to light recording the first ever meeting of the Society on 10 November 1904 when the motion, 'In the opinion of this House the adoption of conscription would be advantageous to this country', was lost by 10 votes to 20. Seven years later the motion 'In the opinion of this House compulsory military training should be adopted in England' was carried by 15 votes to 8. Other 1911 motions included, 'This House would welcome the complete success of the rebellion in China', carried by 15 votes to 7; 'In the opinion of this House Old Age Pensions in their present form are a source of evil', lost by 13 to 8, and 'In the opinion of this House the Government should prevent by legislation the possible recurrence of such strikes as those of this summer,' which was carried by 10 votes to 9. ■

Miss Florey

Anne Florey, an Australian, was the School matron from 1922 until her retirement in 1947. A qualified nurse she had served in Gallipoli and Mesopotamia during the First World War with the Queen Alexandra Imperial Military Nursing Service. To many OAs of that era, Miss Florey with her little dog and her emphasis on good manners, together with Mr Grundy the Headmaster, epitomised the School. OAs report that she often talked about her brother and the important work that he was doing in Oxford, but no one thought anything of it until the day in 1945 when Mr Grundy announced that there would be a half-holiday in honour of Miss Florey's brother who had just been awarded the Nobel Prize for Medicine. Her brother was of course Howard Florey, the man whose pioneering work on the medical use of penicillin transformed medicine. ■

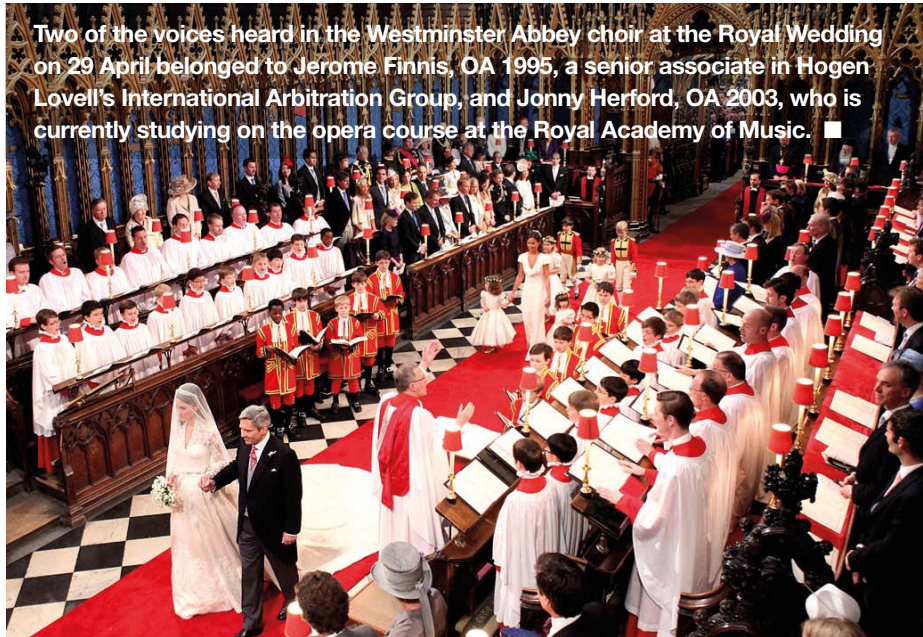

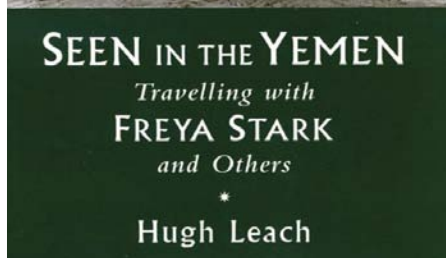

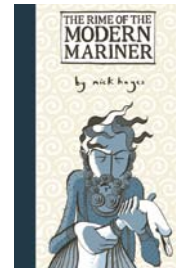
Botany: A Blooming History
