# **Brilliant Results!**



Evidence of the School's 'high academic attainment' comes with this summer's exam results. At A-level, 50% of all results were Grade A and five boys, Koel Ko, Tony Lau, James Li, Anthony Mak and Oliver Zeldon, gained five A grades each. The UCAS points score for the School was 402.

Of the GCSE candidates, 100% gained at least five passes at grades A\* to C, and 69.2% achieved all A and A\*s. One boy, Arjun Kingdon, achieved twelve A\*s and David Rawcliffe and Stuart Robertson both got eleven.

Libya

# **Boat Club**

The School had two crews competing at Henley Royal Regatta this year. The 1st VIII, who were seeded, won through to the semi-finals of the Princess Elizabeth Cup before losing to the eventual winners, Eton. The 2nd VIII, who did very well to qualify for the Temple Challenge Trophy, were knocked out in the second round by Cornell University.



# **Athletics**

In the House Athletics Competition, which took place at Tilsley Park on 18th May, Elliott's took the overall trophy with a total of 702 points - an excellent victory given the numerical might of the Boarders, who came second with a total of 663 points.



# Tennis

On Wednesday 29th June the U15s and U13s played in the Oxfordshire finals of the Nestlé Cup, neither team having previously lost a match. The U15s beat Gosford Hill and the U13s beat King Alfred's Sports College. As a result they will now play each other in the regional qualifiers in September.

Michael Watkins won the British U12 National Championship in Bournemouth this summer. He is the first Oxfordshire male to win a British title since Tim Henman became U18 champion in 1992.

# Under 14s win Lord's Taverners' Trophy

The Under 14 XI crowned their magnificent season of eleven unbroken victories with a ninety-eight run win over Bloxham in the final of the Lord's Taverners' Colts Cricket County Trophy. James Manasseh scored 83 in this match, and a total of 457 in the season, giving him a batting average of 57.1. Tim Deeks, in a seven-over spell, bowled 4 wickets for 17 runs.

The inspection of Abingdon School by the Independent Schools Inspectorate was carried out between 25th and 29th April. A team of fifteen inspectors visited 192 lessons or parts of lessons, examined extensive samples of pupils' work, attended four assemblies and thirty-one registration sessions, observed fifty-four extra-curricular and sporting activities, held discussions with fifty-eight teaching and non-teaching staff, met four governors and analysed the responses of 485 parents to a questionnaire distributed in advance of the inspection.

As pupils go through the school they develop in independence and increasingly show the ability to think, write and argue independently. The school's ethos of high academic aspirations informs pupil confidence, self-esteem and endeavour. In the classroom, pupils were observed reasoning, solving problems and applying their knowledge effectively. The layout of the chapel is simple but appropriate and the newly installed stained glass window depicting the Trinity helps to provide a calm spiritual atmosphere.





The library is located in the heart of the school. A good range of 16,000 books meets both the educational and recreational needs of the pupils and is supported by a comprehensive range of newspapers, magazines and journals, a collection of audio tapes and DVDs. ... The library is particularly popular at lunchtime, when a relaxed but purposeful atmosphere prevails and boys read, study, and use the fourteen computers.


# The Revd. Joseph Hewlett

The School has recently bought the family papers and diaries of the Revd. Joseph Hewlett, a novelist who was headmaster of Abingdon from 1828 to 1839. *The Dictionary of National Biography* states that Hewlett "did not hold the post long" which, as eleven years appears to be a fairly respectable tenure for a headmaster, rather calls into question its judgement that Hewlett's "career there was a failure". It would certainly not have been a happy time; he became insolvent for the second time, and his wife was constantly unwell. In addition, Hewlett found it impossible to keep the School's numbers up - perhaps, as he said in one of his novels, because the headmaster

was compelled by statute to limit his teaching to the dead languages, and consequently, seldom had a town pupil.

# ... and rowing at Abingdon

From Hewlett's diaries it would appear that he spent all his time wining, dining and 'cigarring' with the worthies of Abingdon and Oxford, since the School is hardly mentioned at all. However, on 28th June 1830 he notes, "Went to Sandford with the second crew." From the context Hewlett is talking about four-oar rowing and this casual remark takes the history of rowing at Abingdon School back from 1840 to 1830 thus making it, after Eton and Westminster, the third oldest school boat club.





### **Parsons and Widows**

Among Hewlett's novels is a semi-autobiographical work, *Parsons and Widows*. This three-volume work came up for sale recently and was bought for the School by six members of the John Roysse Lodge: **Roger Chester** (OA 1964), **Nigel Hammond** (OA 1957), **Martin Iredale** (OA 1956), **Garth Round** (OA 1953), **Telfer Saywell** (OA 1958) and **David Willis** (OA 1965). Hewlett was a Freemason, a member of the Lodge of True Friendship in Rochford and Chaplain in the Provincial Grand Lodge of Essex. When he died, at the age of forty-seven, his Masonic brothers erected a headstone on his grave.



# Marathon Men

Among the 36,000 starters in the 25th London Marathon on 17th April 2005, were three OAs: **Duncan Hancox** (OA 1993), **Antony Ashton** (OA 1996) and **Robert Rothkopf** (OA 2000). We're glad to report that all three were among the 34,175 finishers too. Duncan Hancox, who runs with the Abingdon Amblers, came 1,435 overall in a time of 3:04:47; Anthony Ashton's position was 4,109 in a time of 3:28:02 and Robert Rothkopf's 4,230 and his time 3:32:31.

A week earlier Antony Ashton with **Richard Binning** (OA 1996) and **Oliver Greasby** (OA 1996) won the 2005 National Manhunt, a fourteen-hour test of endurance and night-time navigation in the mountains of North Wales.



# A 21st Century Conservative

Following the General Election in May, Michael Howard appointed the Right Honourable Francis Maude (OA 1971), formerly MP for North Warwickshire (1983-1992), as the new Chairman of the Conservative Party. As Chairman, it will be his responsibility to see through the creation of a new constitution for the party. The draft, published on 25th May, sets out changes in the way the leader is to be elected and attempts to articulate a statement of Conservative principles for the 21st Century, principles which Francis outlined in a speech to the Centre for Policy Studies on 15th June.
