# £20,000 for Charity

# **Dedicated to the Holy Trinity**

The Right Reverend Richard Harries, Bishop of Oxford, dedicated the new east window above the altar in the Chapel on 7th October. The subject of the window is the Holy Trinity, reflecting the dedication that John Roysse chose for the school he helped re-endow over four hundred years ago. The window was commissioned to mark the centenary of the Chapel, dedicated to the Holy Trinity on Trinity Sunday, 7th June 1903. The symbolism in this dramatic window, the work of the Oxford glass-artist Nicholas Mynheer, is echoed in the new altar frontal, burse, veil and lectern fall, embroidered by Mary Barton of Abingdon.

Each year TASS and Tappins Coaches join together to fund travel projects for boys leaving the sixth form. Philip Craig, who won an award last year, sent this report of the time he spent in Malaysia:



'My time at Uplands, the British International School at Penang, a large island off the North West coast of Peninsular Malaysia, were some of the best months of my life. I had a great variety of roles at the school - in classes I would sometimes be listening to year 1s (5-6 year olds) read or help them with their maths puzzles; in other lessons I might be with the year 4 set helping to control the chaos in a Art Lesson! A lot of my time was spent helping students both in and out of lessons with their English. I also had responsibilities in the boarding side of the school: helping the younger pupils with their homework in the evening during the week and being an extra 'adult' on afternoon trips at the weekend. During school holidays and over long weekends my Gap partner Chris and I would travel as much as possible. Highlights included climbing Mt Kinabalu, the tallest mountain in Southeast Asia; learning to SCUBA dive on the Pehrentian islands, one of the best dive sites in the world; going to the Malaysian Grand Prix in Kuala Lumpur; and walking in bat caves underneath some of the oldest rainforest in the world.

I cannot recommend a Gap Year enough. I had the time of my life and saw and experienced far more than I had imagined was possible.'

# OAs in the Oxford DNB

The Oxford Dictionary of National Biography, a sixty volume, sixty-two million word collection of fifty thousand lives, was published in September 2004 having been ten years in the writing. Whilst the books occupy twelve feet of shelving, the online version can be searched at the touch of a button. Doing so reveals that twenty-nine of the entries have associations with Abingdon School.

These include the Tudor diplomat, Sir John Mason, who was present with Henry VIII at the Field of the Cloth of Gold; Sir Thomas Smith, Latin Secretary to James I and Sir Edward Turnor, Speaker of the House of Commons in the Restoration Parliament. Among the OA clergymen are Francis Ayscough, tutor to the young George III and William Newcome, son of the vicar of Abingdon, who rose to become Archbishop of Armagh and Primate of All Ireland.

The longest OA entry is probably that of Sir John Holt, Chief Justice of the King's Bench following the Glorious Revolution of 1688, who played a significant part in drawing up the Bill of Rights.

Four of Abingdon's headmasters have an entry: Thomas Godwyn, John Lemprière, Joseph Hewlett and Sir James Cobban. Sir James's entry was written by his successor Sir Eric Anderson, whose successor, Michael St John Parker, contributed six of the total entries.

# The Mastersingers

Long before the days of Radiohead a group associated with Abingdon School had a record in the charts, reaching number twenty-six the same week that Manfred Mann made number one with 'Pretty Flamingo' in May 1966. Produced by the Beatles producer, George Martin, and recorded in the Abbey Road studios, 'The Highway Code' was set as a psalm by John Horrex who sang with the group that included George Pratt, Geoff Keating and Barry Montague. The group also recorded a version of The Weather Forecast and From Me to You in Latin.

# OAs in Band Aid 20



Jonny Greenwood (OA 1990) on guitar and Thom Yorke (OA 1987) on piano, both members of the OA band Radiohead, together with Sir Paul McCartney and brothers Dan and Justin Hawkins from The Darkness, were the core instrumentalists on Band Aid 20's 'Do They Know It's Christmas'. On Sunday 14th November a host of stars, including Robbie Williams, Dido, Will Young and Bono, came together to record the vocals. Two days later, the completed

track was ready. It went straight to number one and remained there for four weeks, selling more than 1.2 million copies. Twenty years ago, the first Band Aid record raised over ten million pounds for famine relief in Africa; the proceeds of this new recording are intended to help the victims of famine in the Dafur region of Sudan.

# **OA Journalists**

Four Old Abingdonians describe how they entered journalism - always a popular career choice.

Alan Huw Smith (OA 1961) now a freelance writer was a reporter, specialist writer, columnist, political correspondent and news editor for The Guardian. He read Economics and Politics at Trinity College, Dublin, but spent most of his time editing student journals. He joined The Guardian after a three-year apprenticeship with The Oxford Mail. He retains an interest in the training of journalists.

**Ben Longstaff (OA 1995)** is a senior sub-editor on The New Scientist. He read Mathematics at Pembroke College, Oxford, and, on the recommendation of a friend, applied for an internship with The New Scientist. Following the placement, he was offered a job and is still with them. He says the graduate recruitment scheme is still running.

**Richard Wooldridge (OA 1959)** is President and Chief Operating Officer of The International Herald Tribune, based at its offices in Paris. He began his career as an apprentice on The Maidenhead Advertiser and three years later took The National Council for the Training of Journalists Proficiency Exam. For fifteen years he edited a number of provincial newspapers, was appointed Editorial Director of Westminster Press in 1992 and to his current position in 1998.

**Richard Tilley (OA 1988)** is Sports' Editor of The Oxford Times. He read History at Durham and then took a oneyear course in journalism at Highbury College, Portsmouth. His first job was with The Henley Standard. He joined The Oxford Mail and Oxford Times in 1995 as a sports writer and was appointed Sports Editor in 1998.
