Remembrance

This year, as in previous years, boys and staff stopped for two minutes at 11am on Monday 11 November as part of our own and national remembrance commemorations. The twominutes' silence was respectfully observed, and was punctuated by the poignant strains of 'The Last Post' and the 'Reveille', this year played by Max in Year 8.



Boys will have had their own particular people or memories to consider. However, many may have thought back to the previous week's assembly in which Michael, a local historian and ex-Abingdon parent, came in and taught them about some of the local men who had gone off to fight, and, in some cases, did not return. These included Charles Bond, who actually lived in what is now Josca's House, before he went to the Western Front. Sadly, Rupert Aldworth, the son of a local farming family who owned land in Frilford, was one of those who did not return. Michael also emphasised the influence of the war on local families, especially the women and children left behind, some of whom suffered multiple losses which inevitably impacted greatly on what was then a largely agricultural community. We are very grateful to their contribution, as we are to those who continue to serve our country. Stefan Gerrard



Year 5: The Vietorian Uving Museum



Year 5 pupils, who are investigating how life for Victorian children changed over time, visited the Victorian Living Museum, Dudley.

We descended into the coal mine, exposing the boys to the cramped and dangerous conditions experienced by young Victorians, complete with an explosion showing how coal was dislodged from the seams. Happily, we emerged



unscathed, albeit after a shorter shift than our Victorian counterparts. The schoolroom gave the opportunity to write with slate and chalk, and to recite the alphabet and tables, as well as experiencing some Victorian discipline! The boys also visited a selection of Victorian era shops and houses to see and hear demonstrations of Victorian housekeeping and toiletry habits. Purple tongues did result from the trip to the sweet shop, although we were glad to report there was no arsenic in the confectionery, as in the 1800s. A final highlight was watching a blacksmith at work in the forge. Sparks really did fly. A successful trip, and in no small part owing to the good attention and questions posed by the boys.

Year 8's Geography field trip theme was coastal geomorphology. On the first day, the pupils visited Durdle Door, Stair Hole and Lulworth Cove, studying features of a concordant coastline. The day after, in testing weather conditions, they examined a discordant coastline getting up close to Old Harry Rocks and the Pinnacles, and investigating the

changing profile of Studland Beach. On the final rather rainy day, the boys visited Corfe Castle. A successful trip, and a memorable one for the richness of its landscapes, coastal features and... its dramatic weather!

APS Quizzers at MCS



Two Abingdon Prep teams went to the annual Worldwise Quiz hosted by Magdalen College School. The teams faced several rounds of questions, all of a geographical nature, ranging from locational knowledge to map reading. Both teams performed soundly in a large field of entrants. The Prep's B team enjoyed some success – ie they won some chocolates! – by winning the round on fieldwork-based questions.



Two teams from Years 5 and 6 competed in the annual Prep Schools Quiz Challenge at Magdalen College School in Oxford. They pitted their quizzing skills against a number of local preparatory schools. Rounds included questions on high culture, geography, history, politics, art and literature. Both teams fared very well, with the teams finishing in respectable mid-table positions out of the 22 teams that took part.



There was great excitement in October when a team came to re-home the swarm of honey bees that had been resident behind the weatherboards in our school hall roof-void since late last spring. They had not been bothering us unduly, but as the weather got cooler, they were becoming more angry when agitated by any nearby noise and vibration. Removing the boards revealed a whole row of honeycombs. The bees were gradually sucked into a special box to transport them to their new homes in a local apiary, and the combs removed – the wax structures were dripping with honey!

Many of the boys came to look, and the beekeepers showed them the special box and talked to us about bees. If you put your hand near (but not on) the grille you could feel the heat coming off the hundreds of buzzing bees, including the queen, inside. Soon, any remaining bees were all gone.

Year 3 and 4 Art Club

At the end of October, Year 3 and 4 Art Club was getting into the Halloween spirit making 'batty bats' with help from two of our Year 8 art leaders. Fangs, oversized wings, and googly eyes featured aplenty in the boys' spooktacular 3D batty creations.




Year 3 made pictures using natural vegetable paints


November
