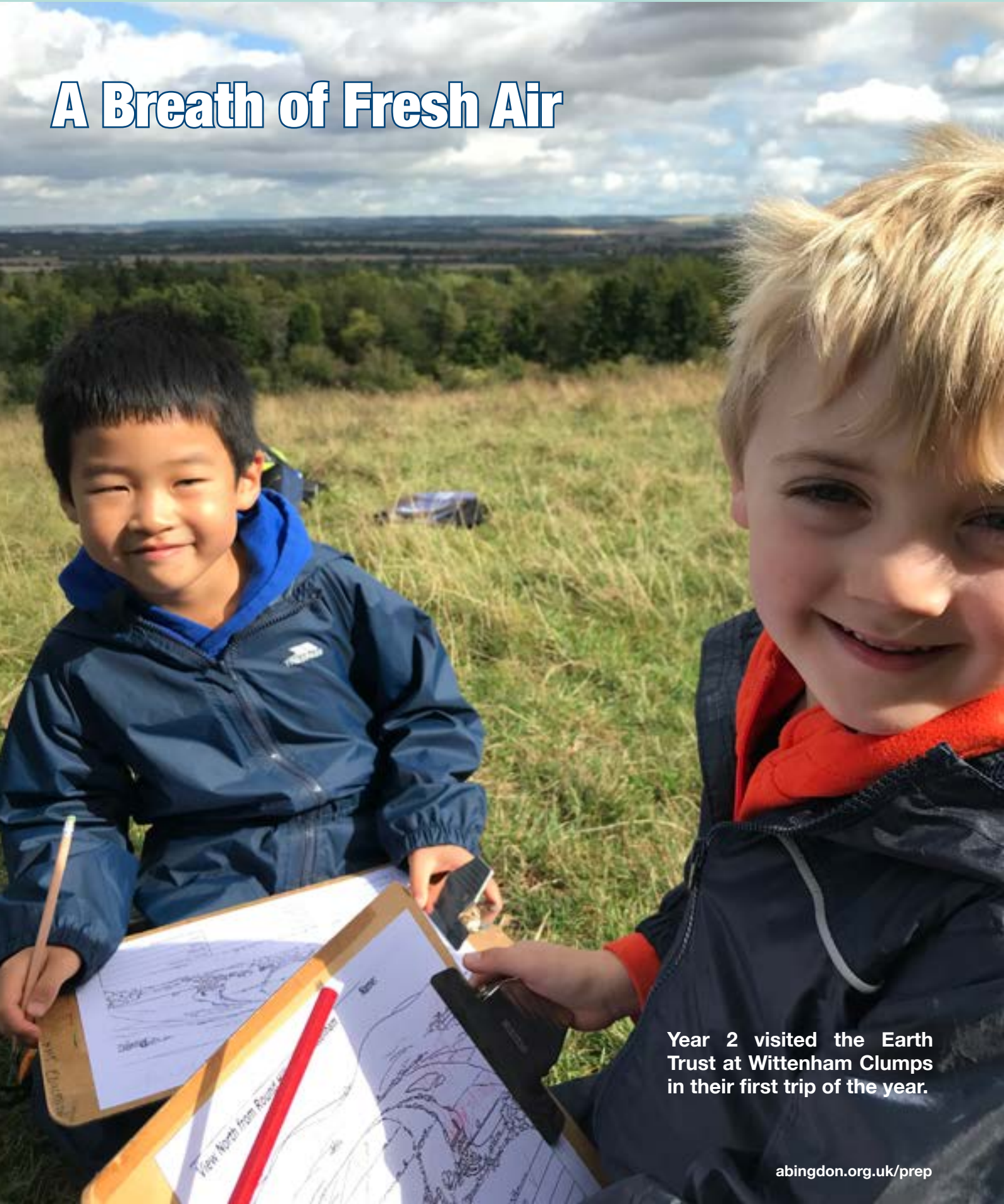


A Breath of Fresh Air

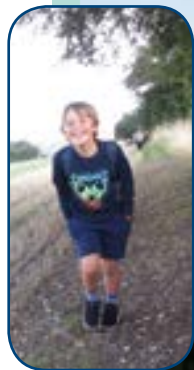
Democracy in action - voting for class reps



The boys in the Middle Section had a true taste of democracy this month when voting for their class representatives. Each class in the school elects a class representative, chosen anonymously by their peers, to join the school pupil council. Abingdon Prep highly values the pupil voice, and the school council meets regularly to discuss all the ideas that the boys in each class bring to the table.

The boys in Years 5 and 6 experienced this election as though they were voting for an MP in the outside world. Boys received a polling card with their name and the address of the polling station. They were escorted to the station where they presented their card and, after confirming their full name, received a ballot paper with the names of all the candidates. They then took these to their private polling booths and, careful not to spoil their paper, put an "X" next to the candidate that they wanted to choose, before folding their paper and popping it into the secret ballot box. The winners were announced by the Headmaster in assembly. Having spoken to several of the boys, they say that they now feel more prepared for what an election is really like, and will certainly vote when they are older. It's not too scary really!

Year 4 Ridgeway Walk



The Ridgeway was at its glorious best for the annual Year 4 walk and night away. Expanded from the DreamWorks animated film, the musical tells the story of Moses from being hidden in the bulrushes as a baby through to leading the Hebrews out of Egypt by parting the Red Sea.

During the interval, the boys were fascinated by peering into the orchestra pit to discover where the music came from. Science Partnership

Due to lockdowns it had been a long time since the Abingdon Science Partnership could welcome visitors from schools in and around Abingdon to do workshops.



Year 5 was invited to the Yang Science Centre for a trial run of a density workshop led by a new team of sixth form scientists. The boys all enjoyed getting to wear the junior lab coats and working with the workshop leaders to build density ladders in measuring cylinders. They had four coloured solutions, which if added in the right order would sit on top of each other, with the most dense at the bottom and least dense at the top. Simple but great fun!

Some time ago, boys from our Science Clubs at Abingdon Prep participated in a project measuring air quality and submitted posters to a competition judged by ATOM (who run Abingdon

Year 8 Dorset Field Trip



Blessed with glorious weather, the boys could see with their own eyes the features they had investigated through maps, diagrams and photographs back at school. The first day took in Durdle Door, Stair Hole and Lulworth Cove, with lunch on the beach. Following a short hop by coach to Swanage via Corfe Castle, the boys were then thoroughly briefed on various aspects of oceanography, weather and climate, maritime and coastal hazards, and the network of mostly voluntary organisations that help us to stay safe at and next to the sea. There was nothing that Stuart, our excellent guide from the National Coastwatch Station at Peveril Point, did not know about the surrounding coast and ocean floor.

The next day we walked along the beaches of Swanage Bay, investigating the various defences designed to protect the town and land behind. As we climbed up and over Ballard Down, the panoramic vistas across Studland and Bournemouth Bays, right across to the Isle of Wight, came into view, giving ample opportunities to see and enjoy Old Harry Rocks and the Pinnacles up close. After a well earned picnic lunch at Middle Beach, and a brief study of dune succession across Studland Beach and Nature Reserve, the boys were finally allowed to dip their toes in the English Channel and enjoy some time in the sand before we headed back, glowing with sunshine, good memories and, I hope, enhanced knowledge of a key unit of their AP+ geography curriculum. Those who were brave enough also got to handle some of the museum's hissing cockroaches after discussing their adaptations!



After the lecture there was time for more art, drawing some of the unique details of the museum's interior and animals, plus a science trail of some creatures with interesting adaptations to discover. Naturally, the museum shop provided its own attractions too!

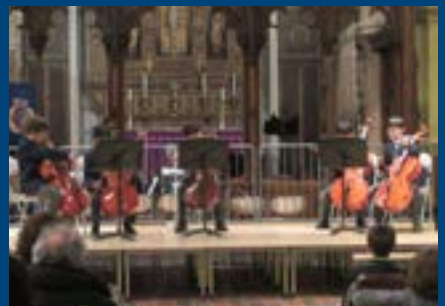

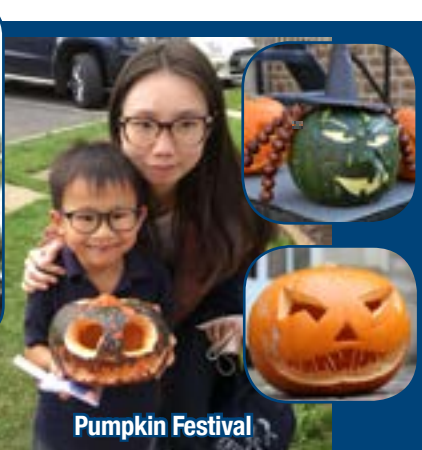


Reception's First Day

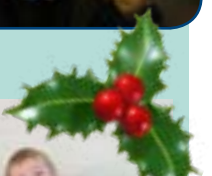
Festive Fun at Roves Farm
