EDITORIAL.

WE wish to welcome to the School the Rev. T. Layng, who was appointed to the Head Mastership last Christmas, but did not come into residence till this term. The School reassembled a week later than usual, and to compensate a week has been added to the end of the term; the reason was

that the Governors had determined—in order that nothing might be wanting to ensure the success of the School under the new management,—to put the School buildings into thorough order both inside and out, and the usual Easter holidays were found to be too short to admit of all the requisite arrangements being carried out. We desire publicly to acknowledge our debt of gratitude to them, and we wish the new Head Master, the School, and of course ourselves, all prosperity.

The School year has not been so successful in Cricket as we could have wished. The loss of our last year's Captain, W. Morland, who left at the end of last term, was a severe blow. In our first match against the Town Second XI, he signalized most unpatriotically his first appearance against his old School by making fifty odd runs. The



new Captain, W. O. Holmes, with only four of last season's team to assist him, found the task before him by no means easy. He obtained however, valuable assistance from the Masters, and in Anwyl he found, if not a stylish, at any rate a powerful bat, and one who has the happy knack of making runs when runs are most wanted. Amongst the smaller boys too there is plenty of promise, as they showed by the decisive way in which they defeated the Town Juniors. Though the season opened badly, there has been some improvement as it went on, especially in fielding, to mistakes in which many decisive defeats were due. The team as a whole is much smarter than it was. but they have not yet attained within a measurable distance of perfection.

The great holiday of the term was not as it usually has been, Whit Monday, but the Sixth of July, the day of the Royal Wedding. This day was celebrated in the town as a universal holiday, by the loyal out of loyalty, by those who were not particularly loyal, because they thought that any excuse was good enough to justify a jollification. Hence it was that there was no discord, but harmony everywhere, and the most unexpected people were seen decorating and illuminating. At half-past one there was a procession of all the children in the neighbourhood, and judging from appearances, we should say that there was no fear of the rural districts becoming depopulated. The procession assembled in the Park and marched

through the Market Place, where the Town Council under umbrellas,-we thought in robes and sunshades they would have presented a more imposing appearance—were assembled to receive them, and from there they proceeded to the meadows by the river, where they were provided with buns, gingerbeer and swings. After that there were races on water and land, and Captain Boyton's men gave a highly interesting aquatic performance and blew up things. When it became dark there was a procession of illuminated boats, which speaking generously, we think was far the prettiest sight we have seen on the river at Abingdon. The day was concluded by an aquatic bonfire, so huge that the people of Abingdon can now boast that they have almost succeeded in that difficult feat of setting the Thames on fire. In short, our celebrations were marked by such loyalty and spirit, that rumour,—for the accuracy of this we will not however vouch,—says that when what we were doing was reported in Town, the newly married pair remarked, "Bother Sandringham, let's go to Abingdon."

On Tuesday, the First of August, there will be a Regatta, open to Past and Present members of the School. A Committee has been formed, consisting of representatives of the Past and Present and Masters. There was a general wish that after the Races there should be an Illuminated Procession of Boats. This, as we have mentioned, was the most marked feature of the

Wedding Day Festivities, and we hope that an equal measure of success will attend our efforts. Our thanks are specially due to two Old Boys, H. G. W. d'Almaine, and G. H. Morland, for the assistance they have given us.

THE SPORTS.

The Sports usually form one of the most popular gatherings of the year in Abingdon, and this year's meeting was no exception to the rule. The weather was propitious, and the well-arranged Programme produced some interesting performances; so that there was nothing to detract from the enjoyment of the large and fashionable company that assembled. An enumeration of those present would involve an almost exhaustive list of the best known names in the Society and Sporting circles of the neighbourhood.

Unfortunately however the Rev. T. Layng, the Head Master elect, who was expected to be present, was unavoidably prevented, which was the chief, or rather the only disappointment in the day's proceedings.

The Programme was arranged on pretty much the same lines as other years, with one new feature in the shape of an Obstacle Race. This event produced considerable amusement especially in the gallery—that is to say on the wall. Some of the obstacles were of a somewhat novel character, including as they did a string maze and an unjumpable Water-Jump. The more serious events were well-contested, and

also produced some highly meritorious performances, conspicuous among which was the Long-Jumping of W.T. Morland, who exactly equalled his brother's fine record of last year. Morland and Anwyl in the main divided the open events. They were known to be the only pair in the running for the Challenge Cup, but in the end Morland carried off the trophy by a large majority of points. He beat Anwyl, who was favourite, in the weight, but on the other hand Anwyl turned the tables in the Hurdle Race, Morland falling when leading close to the finish. Anwyl also won the Hundred after a desperate struggle. In both the two long-distance Handicaps the same three runners finished in front, the first and second reversing their positions. Handicapping large fields of runners, whose form is more or less conjectural, is undoubtedly a matter of considerable difficulty, and under the circumstances, little or no fault could be found with the way in which this task was performed. In some former years the scratch men have won without extending themselves much, while in others some one has toddled in ahead from one of the front marks, in a time which showed the chance of those behind to have been quite hopeless. This year the scratch man ran into a place, while the two first men, though their starts were not illiberal, ran distinctly well. A. W. Morland, who won the Half-Mile for the second time, had of course a considerably reduced start this year, but perhaps he had rather the pull of Challenor in the handicap, so that it

was very satisfactory to see the latter turn the tables in the quarter, when the two started level. The handicapping in the sprint handicap was very successful, as in all the heats several runners finished all in a bunch. P. A. Holmes' win was both popular and well-deserved. Among the under-age competitors special mention should be made of A. Payne, who won both the under-12 and the under-14 race in highly promising style. Results:—

A Tennis Court has been started. There was one we believe in antediluvian times, but it was found to interfere with the Cricket. Under the present arrangement this is impossible, no tennis is allowed during the times sacred to its rival.

There are two changes which we are pleased to welcome, one is the introduction of a School Cap (Black with Cerise Stripes) for day boys and boarders alike, and the other is the introduction of drill. It may be thought hardly correct to say the introduction of drill, for there was drill in times past; but the drill that was taught then was, to say the least, a trifle antiquated; and now the Sergeant Instructor of the Volunteers has taken the corps in hand, and an inspection is to be held by Captain G. H. Morland.
