THE SPORTS.

The School Sports took place on the School ground on Saturday, the 3rd of April. Although the weather was not as good as we could have wished, yet a fair number of spectators were present. The programme was carried out quickly and promptly, which reflects great credit on the officials.

High Jump (under 14). (First prize presented by Mr. E. Insley.) A. M. Austin & R. A. Sparkes equal 1; S. Saxby 3. Height 3ft. 10in.

HIGH JUMP (open).

(First prize presented by Alderman Morland.) W. M. Austin 1; P. L. Deacon 2. The winner cleared 4ft. 8in. improving on last year's winning jump.

HURDLE RACE (under 15).
(First prize presented by Alderman Townsend.) Final Heat. J. Aldwinckle 1; P. L. Deacon 2. The winner took his hurdles in good style.

HURDLE RACE (open).
(First prize presented by Mr. W. M. Wilson.) Final Heat. H. A. Taylor 1;
B. Challenor 2. Time 19secs. This was a close race, Taylor just drawing ahead at the last flight.

100 YARDS (under 12).
(First prize presented by Mr. J. G. T. West.) N. B. Challenor 1; R. G. Rice
2. Challenor ran very well and is a promising runner.

100 Yards (open).
(First prize presented by Mr. A. K. Loyd, Q.C., M.P.) Time 11 secs. This was a somewhat easy win for Challenor although the time was bad.

100 Yards (under 14).
(First prize presented by Mr. T. R. Mills.) Final Heat. H. L. Harris 1; H. Hughes 2. This was a good race, a few inches only separating first and second.

100 YARDS (under 11). (First prize presented by Rev. J. H. Jukes.) C. A. Foreshew 1; G. Silvester 2. Foreshew ran well and shows good promise.

200 Yards (under 13).
(First prize presented by Mr. C. M. Robinson.) N. B. Challenor 1; L. F. Gale 2. Challenor again ran well, beating a large field. Gale was a good second.

THROWING CRICKET BALL (open). (First prize presented by Mr. B. Challenor.) A. P. Ward 1; A. T. J. Mc-Creery 2. Distance, 70yds. 2½ft. Ward's throw was not so good as last year.

Half-MILE Handicap (open).
(Prizes presented by Mr. W. R. Portal, president of the O.A. Club. A. P. Ward (15yds) 1; W. J. Eagle (35yds) 2; R. F. Challenor (35yds) 3. Time, 2min. 31sec. A great number entered for this event. Ward ran in good form and won by 12yds.; about the same distance separated second and third.

Consolation Sack Race. (First prize presented by Mr. F. Legge.)

OLD ABINGDONIANS' RACE (100yds). (Prize presented by Mr. J. F. Downing.) Four entered for this event. A. W. Morland just beat his brother on the post after a splendid race.

CHALLENGE CUP.

The Challenge Cup was won for the second year in succession by B. Challenor. He was run very close by W. M. Austin who gained 25 points to Challenor's 28.

Immediately after the last event a move was made to the pavilion, where Mrs. Challenor kindly distributed the prizes. The proceedings closed with hearty cheers for Mrs. Challenor, the Ladies of Abingdon, and all prize givers.

PAST v. PRESENT.

Following the School Sports and Steeplechases the annual Athletic Meeting between representatives of Abingdon School and Old Abingdonian Club took place in the School grounds, on Saturday, April 10th. The Old Boys won seven events, or one less than last year, the School winning the Quarter-mile and The times were rather better than the preceding year although the ground was heavy. The chief interest for visitors was in the fact that both long and short distance races were well contested, particularly the Half-mile. The officials were: -Starter, Mr. H. C. In the second lap Montgomery retired, and entering the third round Winship gave place first to Challenor and then to Coxeter, but with an effort he came up second, and this order was maintained to the last lap when Ward fell out and Cock challenged Winship and Coxeter. Meanwhile Challenor maintained the lead and won by twenty yards from Cock, Coxeter being a good third. Time 5min. 23sec.

SCHOOL STEEPLECHASES.

This usual addition to the Sports came off on Wednesday, April 7th, two events being decided on the Commonan open race of about a mile and a half, straight out and back, across hurdles and ditches; and another of about a mile for boys under 14. Three prizes were given in each event, and the donors in the first case were Messrs. H. C. Orpwood and W. G. Lasseter. The Juniors' race came first. The twelve competitors all got off together, but soon a straggling line was formed. This was so all the way and on the return journey the first three were very much apart. A. M. Austin won very easily indeed having matters all his own way, with L. F. Gale 2, P. Aldwinckle 3; a few yards separating second and third.

The Open race was over the same course lengthened by about half a mile. Twelve started. Ward and B. Challenor were the first to get away, the former leading by a few yards till just before half the distance had been covered, where he broke down and was passed by Challenor. R. F. Challenor and Insley running together passed Ward and attempted to get up to the leader but without success, and B. Challenor increasing his lead won easily. R. F. Challenor ran remarkably well and made a good second, Insley being close up for third place.
