EDITORIAL.

W E take this our first opportunity of congratulating the Headmaster on his engagement, and beg to offer him and Miss Allen our heartiest good wishes for happiness in their married life.

We have next to congratulate ourselves on the employment of the new envelopes for despatching the Abingdonian to those of our supporters, who have to be reached by post. We have already received the grateful thanks of several, who objected to the old wrappers, which involved a double folding of the papers, and even worse evils.

Being in a congratulatory vein, we next shower our approval on those who passed the Locals. S. W. Brown comes out well with a very good Third in the Seniors. P. L. Deacon, O. J. Couldrey, and H. F. Shepherd, obtained good Firsts in the Juniors, Shepherd's being particularly good. Of a total of 28 entered for the Juniors 23 passed; while all of the four who entered for the Seniors gained certificates, which in two cases included exemption from Responsions.

Our Cricket Season was on the whole successful, and was concluded with a brilliant victory over the Old Abingdonians. We report fully those matches for which we had no room in our last issue, and thus complete the whole season's matches, with characters of the XI.

The Regatta was this year even more of a success than in former years, and the Four as will be seen from our account of the race, acquitted itself admirably against a much heavier, and infinitely more experienced crew of O. A's. Mr. Robinson's energetic coaching bore good fruit.

At Michaelmas we came into possession of our new field. It was opened with all due ceremony, P. L. Deacon, as captain of Football, kicking off in the first game played on the ground. The game which ensued was followed with much enthusiasm by a number of spectators, who seemed to realise the historic character of the scene at which they were assisting. With this new field enabling us to keep three games going, we ought to do well at Football this year. It is true that a series of accidents robbed us at the outset of several of our most promising players. while others on whom we had relied to fill vacancies are forbidden the game by the doctor's fiat. However, when our wounded heroes return, we may reasonably hope to get into form. We have already defeated Leighton Park School, and if we lost to Reading-well, we have memories of Cricket that may console us.

Mr. Wood has begun his dancing classes again, and the devotees of Terpsichore seem as enthusiastic as ever.

There was a rumour—could it be true?—that a certain distinguished athlete had exchanged the dumb bells for a skipping rope!

The Lecture Committee has been fortunate this year in securing the Lecturers of the well-known Gilchrist Trust. Many of us have already heard with pleasure Sir R. Ball, and are eagerly looking forward to his able successors.

THE REGATTA.

The School Regatta took place on Monday and Tuesday, July 25th & 26th. The banks in Culham Reach were well filled, especially on the second day with spectators and the miscellaneous collection of craft in which they had arrived. The weather remained fine, though at times it seemed dull and threatening. A new feature of the Regatta this year was the Canadian Canoe Race, which excited a good deal of interest apart from its novelty, owing to the different methods of the crews. The preliminary heats of this and other events, and the Swimming Races were decided on the first day, leaving for the Tuesday the Finals and the Annual Race with the Old Boys, of the latter of which we give an account elsewhere.

In the Water Tournament the third round left in J. Murray, S. W. Brown, N. B. Challenor and A. M. Austin. The final produced a most determined tussle between Brown and Austin, the latter in spite of his pluck being eventually obliged to give in to his stronger opponent.

There were good entries for the School Sculls. It is not to be wondered at that none of the Four after their hard race survived for the semi-final, which lay between Brown and C. A. W. Payne. This was a happy-go-lucky race, in which both competitors had their mishaps, Payne eventually winning by a quarter of a length.

The Junior Pairs fell to Brown and J. E. Montgomery, steered by Greenwood, the "Canader" Race to P. L. Deacon and Turnbull, Sparkes won the Junior Swimming Race, and A. J. Sells the Senior.

THE RACE V. THE OLD BOYS.

This year the race against the Old Boys had caused considerably more excitement than usual. The School Four though very light, were known to be well together and much faster than

last year, while the Old Boys had got together probably their best crew. The School on the Berkshire station got off very smartly, and as 3 in the Old Boys' crew missed his first stroke, were soon leading by half a length, which at the poplars was slightly increased. At this point Thorn showed his experience and judgment and by the time the enclosure was reached had his boat a few feet in front, which he managed to hold to the finish. Time, 3min. 29sec. It was a grand race, and a good finish to the term's rowing, which had been carried on with commendable keenness and punctuality.

Austin was the only member of last year's crew left, and stroked the crew very well all through the practice; unfortunately on the day of the race he was by no means fit and, with 2 late on him, was unable to quicken when it was wanted. He has distinctly improved and swings much better. Challenor at 3 rowed very hard in the race, his flop at the end of his swing made the boat very unsteady; in practice his blade work much improved, and we hope he will keep his rowing up at Oxford. He was a successful captain. Drayton (2) did not quite come up to expectations, his swing forward was very short and consequently made him late on stroke. He tried very hard and ought to be distinctly useful next summer.

Trafford (bow) improved more than any one in the boat, and by the day of the race really showed the best form in the boat, and he always did his hardest and best. The main defects were want of steadiness forward and a consequent lack of beginning. The leg work was good, the hands very smart, and body swing straight.

CHARACTERS OF CRICKET TEAM.

S. W. Brown. An energetic and successful Captain. A first class fast bowler with a good length. Gained the average ball, taking 75 wickets for 7 runs apiece. A hitter of great power, and often useful when others failed.

Good in the field.

P. L. Deacon. A much improved bat from last year; has scored consistently all through the season. Won the average bat with an average of 18. Very energetic in the field. Might make a good slow bowler if he studied his pitch more.

- H. S. Baker. The best all-round player in the team, batting, bowling and fielding well; just missed both bat and ball in the averages; a high class bat with but one weak stroke; in bowling can vary both pace and pitch well. Will be a great loss to next season's team.
- J. E. Montgomery. At the beginning of the season batted well, but in the latter half seemed inclined to hit before he was properly set; as a bowler of medium pace made a most useful change, and always fielded keenly. Shows great promise all round for next season.
- P. J. Clayton. A rather lucky but very useful bat, often scoring when others failed and hitting well especially on the off side. As a wicket-keeper was a fair success but at times was hardly smart enough.
- H. F. Shepherd. At the beginning of the season failed in batting chiefly owing to nervousness, but towards the end showed his true form. Much too slow in the field.
- C. A. W. Payne. Hardly fulfilled the promise which he showed at net practice, but always batted in good style. A very useful field.
- J. Murray. As a bat with more coolness might have been very useful, but is no judge of a run; always smart in the field.
- A. H. Davey. A stylish bat; shows great promise for next season; should learn to make more use of a loose ball and show more keenness in the field.
- B. Challenor. A poor bat with no pretensions to style. Always a keen fielder, who saved many boundaries by his pace.
- N. C. Drewe. Did not fulfil the promise which he showed when batting in practice games at the commencement of the season, but occasionally kept up his wicket well.

FOUNDER'S DAY.

Founder's Day was celebrated this year on Thursday, July 28th. The rain which threatened all day, held off till late in the afternoon, and when it came was too late to effectually spoil the success of the day.

The proceedings began with the usual service in S. Helen's Church at 2.30, the musical portion of which was sung by the School Choir, which had been trained by Mr. Robinson. The Magnificat was Stanford in B flat, the Anthem (Wesley) "Blessed be the God and Father." Solos in the latter were sung by H. L. Harris and Mr. Robinson. The sermon was preached by the Rev. F. J. Foakes-Jackson, Dean of Jesus College, Cambridge.

The distribution of prizes took place in the School Room which was crowded with parents and with friends of the School. Mr. A. K. Loyd, Q.C., M.P. gave away the prizes, and in the course of his speech gave a model translation of a passage in Cicero, which we trust his hearers recollect.

The School Examinations were conducted this year, as last, by the Rev. J. Merriman, D.D., late Fellow of St. John's, Cambridge, (Mathematics) and Mr. E. W. Johnson, M.A., late Scholar of Pembroke College, Oxford, (Classics). Copies of the Examiners' Reports had been printed and were distributed in the room. Both were on the whole highly satisfactory and noted an advance on the previous years. In particular

both examiners expressed a high opinion of the excellent tone and spirit prevailing in the School.

The Head-master in his report made allusion to the probable acquisition by the School in the near future of a new playing field. The list of Honours gained by the School since last year included the following:—Charles Morland, F.R.C.S.; Guy Powell, 2nd Class (1st division) in Classical Tripos; O. J. Couldrey a first class in Junior Locals, being 28th in Latin, 20th in English; Shepherd, a second class; Johnson and Pryce a third.
