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EDITORIAL.

THERE is no room for a long Editorial in this number, and even less need for one than usual. The term has been a long one, but of magnae res gestae there have been very few. Ordinary events, on the other hand, will be found recorded duly and reviewed, we hope, satisfactorily in their proper places under their several headings: and for whatever news there is of a more special character, we must refer our readers to the School Notes.

We were glad to notice a considerable admixture of strange faces amongst us at the beginning of the term, whilst of the "old, familiar" ones the missing percentage was smaller than the average.

Meanwhile the builders have been steadily continuing their work. corridor was covered in during the holidays, and this term has seen the roof put on the Chapel, the north staircase added, and the greater part of the flooring and plastering finished. The opening ceremony is fixed for October, when we hope to see a goodly number of friends and relatives in attendance: The present term, on the other hand, will end more quietly than usual. We cannot expect a public, however generous and enthusiastic to inconvenience itself on our behalf more than once within three months; so it has been deemed advisable to postpone the annual prize-giving until the October function, confining our Summer festival to the Founder's Service in St. Helen's.

CONCERT.

One of the events which contributed greatly to the success of last term's endof-term festivities was the Concert, which was held in the School-room, under Mr. Young's direction, on Sunday, March 23rd. Sacred music only was performed, and a miscellaneous programme was provided, a change which was not altogether unacceptable to a large number of School supporters. The Choir rendered Choruses from Mendelssohn's "St. Paul," Sir Arthur Sullivan's "Golden Legend," and Gounod's "Redemption," of which the last on the programme, which was especially long and difficult, was well done, considering the material which Mr. Young has to mould into shape and the nature of the work under-Solos also and Quartetts were interspersed between the Choruses, in which the Quartett "God is a Spirit" and Mr. Wimberley's Solo "If with all your hearts" deserved most success. Although no numbers were applauded on account of the sacred nature of the performance, we feel sure that none of the audience were displeased with the Concert, and from private opinions which were heard here and there we may hope that they were more than satisfied.

OLD ABINGDONIAN CLUB.

The Annual General Meeting was held at the School, on Saturday, June 21st, immediately after the Past v. Present Match. In the absence of the President, H. S. Challenor was voted to the chair; whilst Rev. T. Layng, V.P. and about twenty other members were present.

The minutes of the last meeting having been read and the accounts for the past year passed, on the proposition of the Chairman, seconded by A. W. Morland, Mr. J. T. Harris, of The Radfords, Stone, Staffs, was unanimously elected President. The Vice-Presidents and Secretaries were re-elected, and the following six members appointed to the Committee: H. S. Challenor, P. L. Deacon, F. J. Morland, H. P. Simpson, A. R. Thorn and F. O. Townsend.

The Hon. Secretary then read a letter addressed to the President by Mr. W. H. Richardson, embodying a proposition that the accounts of the club should be published each year in the 'Abingdonian.' After some discussion, it was resolved that the Statement of Accounts should each year be circulated to all the members in such a manner as should be determined by the Committee.

The meeting then terminated with a vote of thanks to the Chairman.

THE REGATTA.

The School Regatta was held this year on Monday the 16th and Wednesday the 18th of June. The first day, which was devoted to Preliminary Heats, was hardly an ideal day for a Regatta, but we had little rain, and all arrangements were perfectly successful. On Wednesday we

were lucky in having the first instalment of real Summer weather, and a large and enthusiastic concourse of visitors in small craft of all kinds lined the river banks near the winning-flag.

A considerable stimulus has of late been given to rowing at the School through the energy and generosity of Old Boys and friends, who have supplemented their last year's gift of a new Four to the School Rowing Club by a further gift of four other boats, two light and two heavy pairs, an account of which will be found below. This had led to increased interest being shown in aquatic matters, and the performances this year were consequently above the average.

The Committee are to be congratulated for having done away with that wearisome child's play with mops and poles, which we used to designate by the imposing name of "Water Tournament." The School Sculls were also left out of the Programme this year, as no Sculling boats worth rowing in were obtainable. The Swimming Races have been postponed to the end of the term. The gaps, however, in the Programme were well filled up by two new events, which were evidently popular—Senior Pairs and Form Fours.

Of course the race of the Regatta was the Four-Oar Race against the Old Boys on Wednesday. The crews were as follows:—

The School boat jumped off with a slight lead which was increased to nearly half a length in the first hundred yards. The Old Boys rowed gamely, but their opponents drew steadily away, and at the half-way tree had put half a length of daylight between the boats. This position was maintained till they were approaching the enclosure, when Saxby made an effort and drew up a few feet; Hughes answered with his final spurt, and the School crew, rowing long and well together, went rapidly away and won easily by two and a half lengths in 3 minutes, 41 seconds.

The Junior Pairs were very keenly contested; and of the ten Pairs entered, T. F. Bowman and J. W. Duncan with A. A. Brown (cox) proved the strongest and won a close race from Lewington and Keitley in the Finals.

In the Canoe Race (Rob Roy), for which there were forty entries, C. S. Louth and E. F. Clark shewed themselves well matched against one another in the Finals, the former winning by a few yards only.

The Senior Pairs were easily won by C. S. Louth and E. R. George (A. S. B. Payne, cox), who rowed an excellent course. Throughout this race very good rowing was noticeable.

In the Form Fours the V Form came out victorious; the other finalists (the IV Form and Com. I Four) rowed very pluckily, but were a far lighter crew than their opponents. The V Form was made up of E. R. George (bow), R. G. Rice, H. J. A. Payne, H. W. Bate (str.) and J. L. West (cox).

The SCRATCH FOURS were won by C. S. Louth (bow), T. F. Bowman, C. A. W. Payne, W. M. Austin (str.) and E. F. Berry (cox). The winners got a good start and maintained their advantage to the end winning by three lengths.

At the close of the Regatta the prizes were distributed by Mrs. Bromley Challenor, who was thanked with three hearty cheers.

RACE v. St. MARK'S SCHOOL, WINDSOR.

A new and pleasing feature in the present term has been the Four-Oar Race v. St. Mark's School, Windsor. The match was fixed for July 5th, on which day the School Four travelled to Windsor, whither their boat had been forwarded by road, to make their first essay in racing on foreign waters. The result was completely successful, as the subjoined account will show. The race was rowed on the Brocas reach, over a course of rather less than a mile.

Hughes started at a quick stroke and shot in front at once. At the bridge (half distance) the School crew were three lengths ahead. At this point the St. Mark's boat spurted and drew up a little. However the Abingdon crew, who had been taking matters easily, answered with a fine spurt, and rowing well together passed the winning post six lengths to the good, without shewing any signs of distress.

The Executive of the Old Boys' Boat Committee held a meeting in London, on April 2nd, at which a letter was read from the School Boat Club, and it was unanimously resolved that the immediate needs of the Club, as expressed in that letter, should as far as possible be met. The Committee, owing to unexpectedly favourable circumstances, have been able to carry out their resolution much more completely than was at first anticipated, and have consequently provided the School with two tub pairs, obtained from Salter, of Oxford, two racing pairs, purchased from Winter, of Eton, and two new sets of four oars, made by Norris of Putney. All the boats were carefully inspected before purchase; they are in good condition and have been newly painted and varnished.

When looking over the School the other day it seemed to me that when the new buildings are completed there will only be two things wanting to complete the School, namely (1) a good Library, (2) a Museum.

With regard to the former I would suggest that this should be gradually formed by the boys themselves. In my day it was the *lex non scripta* that each boy gaining the Pembroke Scholarship should give a present of books to the Library to the value of £5, and boys in the Sixth Form on leaving the School were also expected to give a book to it. When this desirable custom fell into abeyance I know not, but I think it might be revived with great advantage to the School.

As to the Museum, this might, I think, also be gradually formed by O.As, many of whom are now scattered all over the world. If these would only send Botanical, Zoological and Geological specimens from their various localities, very soon a very useful and valuable Museum might be formed, while O.As nearer home might contribute articles of Antiquarian interest. Where the Museum would be housed is a matter for the Headmaster and the Governors of the

School to decide, but I do not anticipate there would be much difficulty as to this, if we could only get the things together. With many apologies for trespassing on your valuable space.
