FOUNDER'S DAY.

Founder's day was celebrated on Thursday, July 28th.

The commemoration began with the usual service in St. Helen's Church, which was conducted by the Headmaster. The Rev. W. B. Box read the lesson. The preacher was the Rev. A. F. Rutty, formerly Head-Master of St. John's School, Leatherhead, who, basing his sermon on the words "Whatsoever thy hand findeth to do, do it with thy might," insisted upon enthusiasm as the main source of mental and spiritual progress.

After an opening speech in the Corn Exchange by the Head Master—in

which he recounted the various successes gained by past and present Abingdonians during the year, and referred to recent changes in the administration of the School and in its educational curriculum,—the Prizes were distributed by Dr. J. P. Postgate, Fellow of Trinity College, Cambridge, and Professor of Latin in the University of Liverpool.

Merit having been thus duly rewarded, in the course of an address on Education—which want of space unfortunately prevents our printing in full-Dr. Postgate reminded his hearers that a boy must be taught not merely what seems likely to prove commercially and materially useful to him in after life, but what will properly develope everyone of his faculties. His reasoning power must be strengthened; his imagination awakened and stimulated, or possibly controlled; his sympathies enlarged; his taste refined. If this were done, and only if this were done, his education would do its work. It was possible to have a great deal of knowledge and all of it unserviceable: to be excessively well-informed, and exceedingly ill-There was no educational trained. principle more vital than this: "Teach the beginnings perfectly," and, for the learner: "Be right the first time." Another matter affecting education was the right employment of leisure, which was a matter concerning the present age more deeply than it had concerned

any of the preceding. It was a very wrong way of spelling leisure by beginning it with a capital P, and there was no form of work, or even of drudgery, in the world, that was so exhausting as the pursuit of pleasure as a business. Then, speaking to the boys, Dr. Postgate said: "Earnestness, conscientiousness, self-reliance and self-controlthese are the qualities which will make men of you. I will remind you of one phrase of the Romans-than whom no people showed more clearly the importance of character-and I do so because it conveys a lesson which, if I see aright, was never more needed than to-day. It consists of two words "Hoc age "-" Do this." It, however really means, "Do what is before you." If you are doing anything, do that, and nothing else. If you are at work, then work; if you are at play, then play. Let the old Romans' words, "Hoc age," be ever before your mind, and let them summon you to attention, to concentration, and to strenuousness."

Other speeches, mainly complimentary, followed, and the visitors then repaired to the gymnasium, where the Head-Master and Mrs. Layng were "at home."

SWIMMING.

The Summer of 1910 will scarcely arouse warm thrills in the memories of those who look back to it as a "summer." Yet in spite of cold water and very cheerless mornings, the swim-

ming this year has been quite successful. The account of the Water Sports, alone, But if we look at the shows this. "Test" list we see it has regained its familiar appearance, not that we are yet contented with it. As our numbers increase we hope that the percentage of swimmers will increase. We hear that one school boasts of possessing over eighty per cent. of its members, as swimmers, and we have not yet attained Our figures this year only equal record, in regard to the total number of swimmers, and fall short by 3 of the record total in 1906, of new swimmers added to the list. On the other hand, in 1905, the total number on the list was 45 as compared to the present 72. To our last term's list the following are to be added, as having passed the test:-June, H. V. Ellison. July 19th, J. F. Ward. July 27th, C. S. Day. July 28th, R. H. Webb and G. A. Willis.

WATER SPORTS.

The Water Sports were held on July 20th, 23rd, and 26th. The weather was cold throughout; the first day was dull and distinctly wet, it rained a little on the second day, but on the final day, although the water was only at 60,° F. and the maximum atmospheric temperature 62.5.°, yet the sun certainly shone cheerfully, and, for 1910 it was quite a respectable July day, in fact, one of the best July days vouchsafed to us, so that although "picnics on the river" are—

now-a-days—rather suggestive of hot blankets later, yet there were found sundry bold spirits who risked the experiment.

The chief event on the final day again aroused much enthusiasm, and the School maintained their unbeaten record, the time in this, as indeed in seven out of the nine events that can be timed, being a record. All the team races were won in record time, Senior and Junior, which speaks well for the all-round standard attained.

The "Shell" were conspicuous in four teams entered for team-races, and the Fourth form had to meet three of these, and defeat them, to obtain their victory. The "Back" races were strenuously contested, and the entries for diving were above the average.

Of individual swimmers, Wilson was conspicuous, for after Enoch had beaten the School record on the opening day, Wilson actually knocked 3 secs. off the previous record. Hooke as usual made a point of qualifying for every possible final heat, and in the diving, although he had apparently lost all of last year's form, was eventually an easy winner. As a rule not enough attention is given to position at the start. Hooke, alone of all the competitors, really appeared to think out his dive beforehand, and plan the graceful dive he hoped to execute. Some appeared to think that time spent under water would add to the points obtainable!

Eason and Ellison should prove useful swimmers in the future. In fact, a second School VI. could be chosen, not much inferior to the first VI. and there was considerable competition for the last two places in the school team.

The Old Abingdonians had a strong team out, R. V. Weaving in particular surprising us with his powerful stroke. N. B. Challenor expressed great disappointment with his small competitor, who, at the finish, was gaining back what he lost on the dive, and Enoch made up the remaining lost "water" in vigorous fashion. King at the finish was unable to make any impression on Wilson. Of last year's team Donkin, unfortunately, was unable to swim.

We have again to thank Mr. W. A. Burge, in particular, for the prizes he again presented to the winners of the Senior Team races, as also to the other donors of prizes mentioned below, and Mr. Norman Challenor also, who again came over to join in judging the Diving.

The Junior Forms especially are to be congratulated on their enthusiasm; the programme appended will show to what extent prize winners, especially, are indebted to them.

The first match of the season was played against Oxford High School, and resulted in a win for the School by 2 goals to 1, Tame scoring both times. Although the combination of the forwards was good, the shooting was rather feeble. The team, which represented the School was as follows:—(Goal), G. Wilson, (Backs), E. M. Graham and C. E. Cook, (Halves), A. E. Trinder, F. Parker and R. B. Leach, (Forwards), G. J. H. Ashwin, H. V. Campbell, S. Leach, E. G. Tame and R. Haywood.

On October 5th, the 1st XI played against a scratch side selected by Mr. E. R. Winship. In the School team Mr. W. Bevir and E. V. Dyke, replaced Haywood and Graham. The match ended in a loss for the School by 3 goals against 1. Dyke played a magnificent game, and S. Leach scored our only goal.

On October 8th, the School played at Leighton Park School, H. W. C. Barnes replacing Mr. W. Bevir. The game was keenly contested, though the superior weight and size of our opponents seemed rather to dishearten our forwards. The School defence was superb. The

match ended in a draw, Tame scoring our goal.

The School team was again changed when we played Bloxham School on our ground, H. A. L. Donkin playing instead of R. B. Leach. The day was a very wet one, and the ground was extremely treacherous. In this match the forwards displayed more dash than on previous occasions. The match ended in a win for the School by 6 goals against 3. The goal scores were Tame (3), S. Leach (2), Campbell (1).

On Wednesday, the 19th of October, the School met Exeter College Capotters on our ground. The team was the same as in the previous match. A very exciting game ensued, resulting in a win for the School, by 2 goals—both scored by S. Leach—to 1. In this match Leach and Barnes showed considerable improvement, while Donkin, Dyke and Wilson played quite well in their respective positions.

The next match was played against Dorchester College on our ground. Mr. H. H. Gibson and G. A. Willis took the places of Ashwin and Dyke. It ended in a win for the School by 11 goals against 1. S. Leach obtained 6 goals, Tame 3, Barnes 1 and Campbell 1. In this match the backs were uncertain, but the forwards were distinctly good.

In the next match, against Magdalen College School, E. M. Graham and G. J. H. Ashwin replaced Cook and Mr. H. H. Gibson. With the exception of Campbell the forwards laoked dash. The game resulted in another win for

us by 4 goals to nil, S. Leach and Campbell both scoring a couple.

In the return game against Exeter College Capotters Cook again took his place in the team. The side kept well together, although the forwards still shewed themselves rather wanting in dash. As usual, the defence was good, Cook and Donkin playing very well. The match again resulted in a win for the School by 2 goals to nil, S. Leach and Trinder scoring.

On Wednesday, November 2nd, the same team represented the School against Mansfield College. A very poor and uninteresting game ensued. The shooting was weak in the extreme. Donkin played quite creditably. We ran out winners by 7 goals to 1, S. Leach scoring 3, Tame 1, Barnes 1, Campbell 1 and Trinder 1.

The best, hardest and most exciting match we have hitherto played was against Abingdon Town, on their ground. Although the forwards were good at times, they had not enough pluck to overcome the town defence. The School defence was magnificent, Dyke, Trinder and Donkin playing excellently. The match ended in a draw of 1 goal each, Tame scoring. On the whole we consider this a very creditable performance on the part of the school.

The next match was against Oxford High School. E. M. Graham replaced Dyke. The shooting was very bad indeed, Tame being the only forward of any use whatever. Donkin again played well. After a very poor game we came

away the winners by 2 goals to nil. S. Leach and Donkin being the scorers.

The School and XI opened the season badly by losing, by 3 goals against 2, against Oxford High School. The forwards were extremely feeble, and the shooting was very weak.
