#### EDITORIAL.

THE term began under favourable conditions and is running its course prosperously. The 'entrances' exceed the 'exits,' and we are therefore able to record an increase in our numbers.

The results of the Oxford Local Examination compare well with those of former years, in spite of the extension of the age-limit for the Juniors to 17, and the consequent exaction of a higher standard—without regard to the weather. Mr. J. Bernard Baker, who 'visited' us in July on behalf of the Delegates, and

also examined the work done by the candidates, again made a gratifying report, and pronounced the School to be "very much alive." We trust that the Quinquennial Inspection by representatives of the Board of Education, which is fixed for the end of the current month, will discover no diminution of vitality, and prove a source of mutual satisfaction.

We offer our hearty congratulations to the Football Elevens upon their triumphant career, which bids fair to establish another record.

The restoration of the Old Grammar School — which, as our readers are already aware, is being carried out by the munificence of Mr. A. E. Preston, O.A., in commemoration of his Mayoralty—will not now be completed in time for the proposed dinner on the occasion of the Past v. Present Football Match in December. It is expected, however,

that the rooms will be available for the Old Abingdonian Dinner—with Mr. Preston as the guest of the evening—in the third or fourth week in January. On such a unique occasion there will doubtless be a goodly muster both of those who received their education in the old buildings, and of those who have carried on the traditions of the School in the new ones.

Several interesting discoveries have been made during the progress of the Pieces of carved stone and work. window tracery in the walls are evidence that the ruins of the Abbey contributed material to this, as to so many other buildings in the town and neighbourhood, while the removal of the panelling disclosed the presence of various less ancient relics, including some Early-Victorian exercises and—a birch. It has been suggested that this venerable weapon (flourished circa A.D. 1840) should be prominently displayed at the inaugural banquet, like the sword of Damocles, to remind the revellers that they, too, are mortal men—with a past. From what we have seen and heard, the Old Schoolroom, with its armorial glass, should present a very handsome appearance, and will certainly prove a most valuable addition to the Corporation Buildings, which are now approaching the period of their thorough and successful restoration.

#### FOUNDER'S DAY.

The pious Memory of our Founder was duly celebrated on July 25th, and there was a large gathering of parents, friends and Old Boys. The Service at St. Helen's, conducted by the Headmaster, was fully choral—the Anthem being "How lovely are thy dwellings fair!" (Spohr)—and the sermon was preached by the Rev. R. G. Parsons, Principal of Wells Theological College and Fellow of University College, upon

the words "Who then is the greatest in the Kingdom of Heaven?" After referring to the long and honorable history of the School, the preacher urged the necessity of testing all work and all aims by the Christian Standard, and of cultivating the highest ideals. So long as our modern education inspired the young with the desire of social service, and eliminated the mere selfish craving for success without regard to the general good, our schools would always send out into the world those who would not be least in the Kingdom of Heaven.

A move was then made to the Corn Exchange, where Dr. T. H. Warren, President of Magdalen College, Oxford, presided, supported by Sir Henry Bliss, the Rev. R. G. Parsons, Alderman Shepherd, Mr. H. S. Challenor, the Rev. P. C. Bevan, Mr. H. T. Clarke and the Headmaster and staff.

The Headmaster opened the proceedings with a report of the work done by the School during the past year, and of the successes gained during that period by past and present members, and the prizes were then distributed as follows:—

In his address to the boys, the President of Magdalen described Abingdon as no common or ordinary place, and said that John Roysse had shown his wisdom when he refounded the school amid the educating and informing influences of so ancient and historic a a town. "The gallant little College of Pembroke" owed some of its position to its association with the School, which had produced many eminent

men, and was, as he had every reason to suppose, still worthily maintaining its traditions. Speaking of Education he considered Poetry as one of its most important parts, and recommended the study of it as leading to a better understanding of the times in which we lived and of those that had gone before us. In conclusion, he congratulated the School on its present position, and expressed the hope that its intimate connection with the University of Oxford would be fraught in the future, as it had been in the past, with great advantage to both.

After the usual complimentary speeches the company repaired to the School, where it was hospitably welcomed by the Headmaster and Mrs. Layng.

This annual match took place on July 15th. It was a glorious day and a large number of visitors watched the cricket.

Graham and Bruce opened the innings for the School, but before long Bruce was caught by Stevens. Parker was the next batsman. He made 4 runs and was bowled by W. Leach. S. Leach was caught off the next ball at point, three wickets, captured by W. Leach at the cost of 5 runs, being down for 26. Mortleman gave Graham good support for the fourth wicket, and the score was carried to 68 before they were separated, Graham having made 41 in good style. Donkin, Tame, Bury and B. Harvey were then dismissed in rapid succession, Challenor obtaining three wickets in one over, but Walker hit out pluckily and when lunch came the score stood at 151 for 9 wickets. The last wicket put on 81 runs, Walker being not out with a very useful contribution of 71. The Old Abingdonians began badly, losing Stevens and Holland for 18 runs, and E. H. Harvey was the only man to reach double figures, scoring 59 in clean and forcible style.

In the second innings the School fared very badly, being evidently too confident of success, Mortleman alone reaching double figures. W. Leach and Edgington bowled well, taking 5 wickets each, and dismissing the School for 65. A close finish was now anticipated, but the O.A's. gave an even worse display than their opponents, being disposed of for 65 by Bruce and Parker, who bowled unchanged, the former capturing 6 wickets for 16 runs. The School thus won an uninteresting match by 76 runs, bringing to a close a most successful season.

#### THE WATER SPORTS.

The fifth annual Water Sports were held at the Bathing Place during the last week of term, the final day being Saturday, July 22nd.

The weather was glorious, and 'old Sol' tried to infect everyone with his genial spirits. The interval—ostensibly we believe, to allow the kettles of sundry picnic parties to boil in peace and quietness, for how indeed can any self-respecting spirit lamp behave in an ordinary manner when tossed hither and thither by the foaming billows that toss and splash when cleft by the brawny arms of struggling swimmers? Moreover the cooling clouds of spray that fill the air around weigh down the struggling kettle-lid that fain would rise, and silence his subtle little song that cheers the waiting watchers. But, to return to earth, or rather, to water, the interval aforesaid proved quite useless for this purpose. It was the best interval we have had. Instead of calm and silence, save for the subdued hum of the chanting kettle-choir; instead of all the sweet Thames simplicity of picnicing propriety, a scene of wild abandon took place. At a given signal, when all competitors had left the water,

a wild rush was made, and

" Hi summo in fluctu pendent, his unda dehiscens Terram inter fluctus aperit, furit aestus arenis," and no doubt many mouthfuls were swallowed. The very oldest Abingdonian present disported himself in the water, and an impromptu "over forty" diving competition was held. believe nearly every O.A. present was in the water, and the School Staff, in spite of our very pious opinion of their merits, certainly sank, in our estimation, every time they left the spring-(However, without board. they, exception, came up again).

A busy week had been spent working off trial heats and some of the finals. There were forty-two entries for the open race, and thirty-three for the open 'Back race,' whilst eighteen entered for the Senior diving, and this latter was reduced to eight for the final day. The form team races were more popular than ever, as many as fifteen teams being entered, VI., V., Remove, and Shell all entering three teams each, though on account of examinations two teams had to be withdrawn, and the distance also for the Senior race was shortened. The time of the winning team (VI. A.) viz.—1 min. 15 2-5th secs. was the best recorded for this distance, though only once previously has the same distance been selected for this event.

For the first time, it was possible to hold a race for boys under 12, and the result was quite encouraging. Mr. Silcox of the Nag's Head, again kindly lent us his raft for the team races, and the only disappointment of the day was the run-away victory by the School

team over the Old Abingdonians. did not anticipate that they would beat us in any case, but as it was, their team was only completed at the last minute by the very sporting conduct of two Old Boys who had both been unwell, but who none the less turned out without a murmur. The School will be getting altogether too conceited about its swimming if they are always to be allowed to win this race; and, as we heard of several prominent swimmers who had not been asked to swim, it seems a pity that an effort is not made to raise the best possible team. There was close enough competition for the three vacant places in the School team, Enoch, Hooke and Donkin being the only old 'colours' left, and the trial heats had to be carefully watched, and in fact an extra trial was arranged, to eventually decide upon the team.

The times are apparently not as good as usual, but the actual performances were probably better. The drought was responsible for an almost entire absence of stream, and last year it may be remembered, that in the Town Sports the open 100 yards race was won well inside world's record time, thus showing the difference a moderate stream makes. Moreover this year there was very little difference between the 'up-stream' and 'downstream' times; as a rule there is a wide margin between them. In any case Enoch proved himself to be one of the best swimmers we have had, and Donkin also was swimming in excellent style.

In the holidays Enoch won the Town Club's Pierpoint Challenge Cup

for the annual Quarter-Mile Race, beating the holder with the greatest ease, for he led after the first twenty yards, and was never pressed. He was also persuaded to act as the Town's representative against the Reading and Windsor champions in the Berkshire Quarter-Mile Championship, and his experience in that race should prove useful. The former event, by the by, has always been won by an Old Abingdonian, though this year, as Euoch has returned to us, it was actually won by a " present" boy.

Various members of the School were. prominent in the Town Water Sports, which were also favoured with splendid weather.

We give a table of results below. We should mention that in the Diving there was some very close competition, though in two cases competitors had to be disqualified through failing to observe the conditions governing the This is a dive that needs plunge. practice, and it is often this dive that decides between winning or losing a prize.

#### FOOTBALL.

The first half of the season has been one of success for both elevens, and we congratulate them on their good record. The first eleven lost their first match against a strong scratch eleven brought by Mr. E. R. Winship, but since that occasion have not lost another. All our School opponents have been

beaten, and Pembroke College is among our other victims.

The scoring in most of the games has been high, but the standard of the forward play could be improved. With our defence, on the other hand, we have no fault to find. The halves have all played excellently, in fact, we think it is a long time since the School possessed three so good, and the backs are quite sound, Trinder in particular having played some very good games. We should like to see the forwards show more dash in their remaining matches, particularly the left wing, and make more substantial use of their opportunities in front of goal.

The second eleven has also done well, and at present are unbeaten. As a whole the team are very slow, the speed displayed by the individual members being in the inverse ratio of their sizes. Crook, whose services we are likely to lack for the remainder of the term, is very promising.

We are sorry to note a slackness in the third game. On occasions the number of boys who have turned out has been too few to enable the keen ones to have a game. As our future elevens are drawn from its members they should see to it that they play hard and often. If a boy cannot play on any particular day on which he may be chosen, he must let the Captain know before the end of school, that his place may be filled.

A.S.F.C. v. Mr. E. R. WINSHIP'S XI.—This match, the first of the season, was played on the home ground on Wednesday, Sept. 27th. The scratch team was very strong, and included A.

THE AGENDA CLUB.

Perhaps some of your readers may have seen in the "Hibbert Journal" for July, 1910, or in the "Spectator" for July 9th, 1910, an "Open Letter to English Gentlemen." That was the first manifesto put forward by a number of Englishmen anxious to advance the welfare of the nation and to increase the sense of social responsibility amongst all classes, but particularly Public School and University men of the rising These men have since generation. formed themselves and others of like mind into the "Agenda Club," which has for its objects the encouragement of all useful philanthropic work. Much is already done by many great and good societies and organizations, but lack of funds and lack of support greatly hamper all these attempts. The Public School boy on leaving his school, the University man going down, have in almost every instance a wish to do

something practical for the good of their fellow citizens, but so often see no means of using their own particular talents and advantages. One of the primary objects of the Agenda Club is to meet this need by providing a bureau of information as to what work there is for such men to do. Here they will be able to find at once in what way they can be immediately useful—the rowing man in coaching boat clubs, the boxer in helping working lads to learn the art of self-defence, the man with a voice in assisting at concerts for the very poor, the born organizer in running Penny Banks, and so forth. business man can help with his advice as to advertising, the doctor in sanitary schemes, the lawyer in legal difficulties: and all will be given work to do within their own immediate reach, and with as little waste of time and energy as possible.

It is a general maxim that the Public Schools and Universities of this country produce as sound and healthy a type of man both mentally and morally as can be found in the world: and if some of the surplus energy of such men can be easily and practically utilised in helping their less fortunate neighbours to lead healthier, cleaner lives under more sanitary conditions, the gain to the nation will be enormous.
