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EDITORIAL.

And so another School year has opened with this country involved in another European war. To those of us who remember the heartfelt feeling of relief that followed the Armistice in 1918 after four years of war with all its waste and horror, it seemed that such a disaster would never be allowed to happen again; and even when the first high hopes of peace and co-operation between the nations failed to materialise, it was still felt that if only for material reasons, Europe would not suffer another war in this generation. The events of the past three years have upset all calculations and made a mockery of recognised standards of international morality, with the result that we are again face to face with the same enemy in defence of the principles in which we believe.

In this struggle, as in the last, Abingdonians are taking their proper share. In this number we publish a first list of Old Boys serving in the Armed Forces, and to make it as full and accurate as possible we appeal for news from, or of O.A's. everywhere.

As for School in war-time—apart from the black-out, achieved by a complicated system of window-frames, curtains, roller-blinds and lamp shades—life proceeds at present according to the regular time-table for the most part. Evening Chapel must perforce be conducted in the Gym, but the School bell rings again, though Wiblin is no longer here to ring it. He and Sergeant and Jack and Reg are somewhere in England with the Royal Berks Regt.

SCHOOL NOTES.

The Report of the Board of Education Inspectors who visited us last term has now been received.

The Board of Education inspect the Public Schools usually once in 8 years so that they can guarantee their efficiency. Our full Inspection was held on the 24th, 25th & 26th of May. They had been so confident about us that they had not inspected us since October, 1928. The following H.M.I.s took part in the Inspection, Mr. R. H. Barrow, Mr. A. R. Marshall, Mr. C. W. Parkes, Mr. C. A. Ronald, Mr. P. Wilson, Mr. R. G. Lean and Dr. G. T. Shaw. Their report was highly satisfactory. They summed up by saying The school as a whole gives a most pleasing impression.' Congratulations on the report have been received from various quarters. It will be a satisfaction to parents to know that the school is being conducted with an up to date efficiency so well established.

As a result of their recommendations we welcome as an additional member of the staff Mr. D. O. Willis, late Scholar of Pembroke College, Oxford. He was awarded his 'Centipede' colours for Athletics and also took Certificate 'B' in the O.U.O.T.C. He takes charge of the History and Geography teaching as well as assisting Mr. Martin with the Physical Training. He is resident Master at the Lodge.

We offer our hearty congratulations to Mr. Martin on his marriage in September, recorded elsewhere, and welcome Mrs. Martin with all our good wishes. At the same time we should like to congratulate her on taking her B.A. at Oxford this term.

In spite of a larger 'leave' than usual at the end of last term, the arrival of 43 new boys has brought our numbers up to a new record level of 177.

The forms are now designated by numbers VI to I, with the Remove between IV and III as before.

We record with great regret the death of Mr. William Brewer, J.P. on July 28th. He joined the Governing Body in 1925 and was still a member at the time of his death. He took a very lively interest in the School and we shall miss his regular attendance at School functions. To him we are indebted for the "Brewer" Bowl for House Cricket. In public life he took a prominent part, having been Mayor of Abingdon, a Justice of the Peace and a member of the County Council.

FOUNDER'S DAY.

Founder's Day was celebrated on Friday, June 23rd. The service in St. Helen's Church was conducted by the Rev. G. R. Palmer and the sermon was preached by the Rev. R. G. E. Dodson, Chaplain of Wadham College, Oxford. The preacher took as his theme the life of John Wesley, and in a vigorous and interesting address pointed out the great qualities in the Evangelist.

At the Prize Giving in the Corn Exchange the Prizes were distributed by Sir Patrick Cadell, who was supported on the platform by the Chaplain of Wadham College, Mr. W. Brewer, Mr. R. W. Langford, Mr. H. P. Simpson, Mr. W. T. Morland, the Headmaster and Mr. W. A. Rudd.

In his report, the Headmaster said that more than one-sixth of the boys in the School had passed examinations of School Certificate standard or higher during the year. During the present term the School had been inspected by the Board of Education Inspectors, who had been most favourably impressed by the wide range of subjects covered and the efficiency of the staff.

After mentioning academic and athletic successes of Old Boys, he thanked the O.A. Club for the vigorous active support they were giving to the School. The five Trustees who administered the O.A. Trust Fund, had now undertaken the trusteeship of the Waste Court property, thus bringing the O.A. Club into close connection with the administrative side of the School.

In his address Sir Patrick laid stress on the implications of the new Military Service regulations. However much the causes might be regretted, none could deny the necessity of military training at the present time, when personal liberty was being threatened as never before—and in the past, Englishmen had always been ready to take up arms in defence of liberty. The O.T.C.'s. were doing valuable work in preparing for such training, but what was perhaps exercising parents and School authorities most was the effect of the measure on the leaving age. It was surely a mistaken policy to cut short a boy's education so as to start him in his business or profession before he was called up for service: it was more necessary than ever that he should have the full time at school, both for its educational value and for its stabilising influence on character.

Cheers were given for Sir Patrick Cadell, the Chaplain of Wadham the donors of prizes and the Headmaster: and the company then adjourned to the School grounds where the Headmaster and Miss Grundy held an 'At Home'. Tea was served in Waste Court, and the usual displays were provided inside and outside the buildings, for the benefit of the visitors.

ROWING.

This year's Marlow crew did not turn out quite so well as was expected. They started training in very promising style and with some weight in the boat it looked as though they would do well; but when it came to rowing a fast racing stroke over a distance it was obvious that the pace was not forthcoming. There is little doubt that this was due to the 'sizing' of the crew, for individually there was nothing radically wrong with the rowing: but an inch or two's difference in arm or body can do a lot to ruin uniformity in a crew. However, when the selection was so limited. nothing could be done about that, and as it was they consistently returned 3 minutes 30 seconds on the School course, though conditions were not good.

West always rowed a plucky race but his length was too much for his weight and he was inclined to row himself out too soon. Hedger made a good '3', and considering his weight is remarkably lively. Nadin showed more steadiness and rowed very hard. Roberts, after trouble with his blade at first, came on well, and his worst fault was a tendency to be early.

CRICKET, 1939.

The season, taken generally, was one of the best we have had for some time. We played 9 matches, won three, drew four and lost two, and there were few games which were not Talent was evenly distributed exciting. throughout the team and we were fortunate in that our stars never shone all together but spread their brilliance over the whole season. The one exception was G. W. Povey, who was uniformly successful and contributed much to our good season. The bowling of J. Richardson and J. A. M. Green was very good, but we were hampered by lack of change bowlers and very often were unable to push home the advantage gained by our batsmen and opening bowlers. Congratulations however, are due to the whole team for their keenness and enthusiasm and to J. Guilfoyle to whom much of the credit for our victories is due.

The first game against Bloxham showed that our batting had distinct possibilities, and A. C. Dean played a well-judged innings of 79. Unfortunately, the bowling and fielding were still uncertain factors and we failed to drive home our advantage.

The feature of the Second game was A. C. Dean's century. As Richardson and Green also found their form and bowled very steadily, and to some effect, we won a match full of good cricket.

This victory undoubtedly put us in good form and in the third match against Magdalen College School, Oxford, Richardson and Green bowled with equal effect. Magdalen declared at 115 for 6, and when we batted Dean was again successful and scored his third 50 of the season. Povey scored a useful 29 and at 6.30 we were 131 for 2 wickets.

The fourth match, against City of Oxford School showed up our greatest weakness—against slow spin bowling. Batting against a total of 116 for 8, we scored 78 for 6 and stumps were drawn with the issue open.

The next match against Queen's College, Oxford was unfortunately spoilt by rain. Our 48 for 1, was a creditable answer to 141 for 7 and Povey batted well for 36 n.o. against good medium fast bowling.

The match against the Oratory, a new fixture, was a lucky escape for us. The last man was in with two overs to play and 50 runs to score. He managed however, using a completely dead bat, to hold out until stumps were drawn.

The Old Abingdonians brought down a strong side. For once we batted first and for some time all was going well. Then we lost one or two quick wickets and were all out shortly after lunch for 158. When the Old Boys batted they proved to be in great form, scoring freely round the wicket, and stumps were drawn in wintry weather after they had won and S. A. Paige had scored a hard hitting 78.

The game against Magdalen College School, Brackley was our fourth drawn match of the season. Randall showed again his true form, which had saved us the Oratory game, and scored 30 not out.

The last game against Wantage School, despite some early shocks, ended in victory and brought the balance of the whole season in favour of victories.

In "Honours Easy", Waste Court showed once again the talent that lives over the way. This was a Ruritanian play in which the king (R. D. Gibaud) has a council of ministers to decide how to avenge an insult from a neighbouring monarch. The army is represented by General Mustachio (P. A. Way), a punctillious procrastinator; the church, by Cardinal Carmine (W. D. Richardson), a cautious, but caustic counsellor. Prince Georgio (G. Hill), the king's half-brother, the accepted fool of the family, keeps everyone's temper high by his shafts and sallies. Queen Paula then intervenes, and arrangements are made to settle the quarrel by a football match. In the second scene a broadcast of the match is heard on the wireless, and all nerves are strained as the fortunes of either side waver. A break-down in transmission only aggravates the excitement which is relieved at last by the arrival and report of a messenger (J. C. Petty). A dramatic moment, too, was the entry of Princess Tamar (C. B. F. Milne), who told them all what she thought about them. High praise is due to C. R. Howell and J. R. Young who were responsible for the electrical installation and the running commentary. The piece was

colourfully dressed and staged, and well acted.

A more serious vein inspired the historical drama, "The Double Deception," given by members of VB.

This was impressively staged in a highland cottage, in the year 1745. The atmosphere of tragedy was well caught, and the costumes added no little to the completion of the picture. Particularly meriting special mention were the bearing and acting of the hero of the piece, Dugald Stewart; whilst the fine figure and clear voice of Captain Sandeman made a small part very impressive.

A return to comedy-indeed farce-came with "The Play's the Thing,"—a bare-board drama. This was specially written by the management to exploit the notion of acting with make-believe stage properties. Sound effects, however, were provided from the wings. The idea was at once made clear when the curtains opened to reveal the butler Brigson (J. M. Leftwich) answering a highly audible ring on a highly imaginary telephone. There quickly enters Margaret (J. A. M. Green), the daughter of the house, who, after knocking over an invisable table and conversing with Bryson, dismisses him in order to get the room to herself; whereupon she hails her prospective fiancé Harry (G. Povey), through the window. He enters by a painter's ladder and they have only a few moments conversation before, Brigson returns to announce the unexpectedly early return of Mrs. Bounce-Blunt. This is most alarming, as she has forbidden Harry the house. The resourceful Brigson suggests that they hide behind a screen, and they have only just 'secreted' themselves when Mrs. Bounce-Blunt (G. Farnsworth), entered, falling violently over her suitcase that Brigson has put down. Mrs. Bounce-Blunt is indeed an eccentric female, and after considerable altercation with Brigson, accompanied by considerable slap-stick, she insists on hiding beneath the imaginary sofa to eavesdrop on an expected burglar. The climax of the sketch comes when Harry and Margaret, fancying they are left alone in the room, come from behind their screen and decide to sit on the sofa! All the parts were competently played, but special mention should be made of G. Farnsworth, whose ample form served as a good foundation on which to build an excruciatingly funny portraval of the eccentric Mrs. Bounce-Blunt. The success of the piece also depended considerably on the exact timing of the noises, which were most competently and realistically perpetrated by H. J. Clarke and B. Arundale in the wings. These two workers, led by R. F. Jackson, were also responsible for the scenery, lights, and manipulations of the whole even-

Another short sketch, involving two actors only, G. D. Randall as *Paidagogos* and J. Graff as *Discipulus*, was "When Greek Meets Greek". The scene was a classroom in which detention was being conducted. As both participators were more interested in the Old Boys' cricket match which could be heard in progress through the window, there were many irrelevancies, and much humour. All the tricks of the trade were competently exploited by both protagonists.

"Then and Now" was an amusing playlet in which a proposal, at a dance, was enacted first as in Victorian times, and then in the modern style. M. Hedger played the part of the young lady with charm and assurance. H. A. Lunghi was the perfect suitor, displaying appropriate diffidence in the first scene, and detachment in the second. R. Hedger figured effectively as the intruder on both occasions.

The final sketch was a *Broadcast Extrava*ganza. The cast was as follows:

- H. E. Mallam, who came here as a boarder in September, 1888, became in due course a useful member of the Cricket and Football XI.s and before he left in 1892, brought honour to the School by winning a Mathematical Exhibition at Hertford College, Oxford. This was later increased to a Scholarship, and after a successful career at Oxford, during which he won his Soccer colours for Hertford and on several occasions brought College teams over to play against the School, he adopted the career of a Schoolmaster. As such he held appointments at Hereford, Rhyl and other places, and in 1926 became Senior Assistant Master at South Lodge, Enfield Chase.
- N. G. Powell was here as a young boy from 1885 to 1891, when he left us for St. Paul's School, London, whence, three years later, he proceeded to St. John's College, Cambridge, as holder of a Classical Exhibition. But as a member of a well-known local (Garford) family—his elder brother, W. W. Powell, who died young in South Africa, and two cousins, the late C. R. Powell and W. R. Powell who is still living at Garford, were also at the School—he still kept in touch with his earlier school and schoolfellows, and on several occasions appeared for the O.A's, in athletic contests v. the school, especially on the river. (Incidently, he had rowed in the University Trial Eights at Cambridge.) A schoolmaster by profession, after three years at Heidelberg College in Germany and seven years at Sunningdale School he became Headmaster of Crowthorne Towers, preparatory School for Wellington College, Berks. Later he moved to Malvern, where he took private pupils, and subsequently to London. He leaves a wife (née Aldworth, of Frilford) and three sons and a daughter.
- R. G. Rice, the eldest of three brothers at the School, came here in September 1895 and left in December, 1903. He played full-back for two years in the School Soccer team and was successful as a bowler in the Cricket team; but it was not until some years after he left school that he reached his full powers as an outstanding athlete. As a member of the British team at the Stockholm Olympic Games

of 1912 he won his heat in the 100 metres and was only just beaten in the final. At Ghent in the same year, at the International Grand Prix meeting, he won the silver cups for the 100 metres handicap and scratch events; and he also competed in the Olympic Games at Antwerp. On several occasions he ran against W. R. Applegarth, the A.A.A. 100 yards champion, and was only narrowly beaten. Earlier in his career, as a student at the London Hospital, he had been consistently successful as a sprinter in the Inter-Hospital sports, and had been chosen to run against Dublin University. Against the School he won five events for the O.A's. in the 1913 meeting, and his High Jump of 5ft. $4\frac{1}{2}$ ins stood as a ground record until beaten by one inch by W. B. Badcock in 1934. During the last war he served in the Royal Berks as a cadet, and on being granted a commission was transferred to the R.G.A. in 1916, seeing service in France.

The Rev. Donald Howes (1922), who has been curate at Holy Trinity Church Chester-field, for the past 14 months, has been ordained priest by the Bishop of Derby.

- L. D. Hutchison (Jack) (1924) has a post as Instructor at an Ice-skating Rink in Nottingham.
- H. S. Bartlett (1925), of the E.T.C., has been invalided home from Gibraltar after a severe attack of fever. We are glad to learn that he is making good progress towards recovery.
- S. A. Fabes (1928) has obtained an executive post in the store branch of Woolwich Arsenal.
- M. Ogle (1929), of the Colonial (Education) Service, sends an interesting account of his work in Penang, written before the outbreak of war. part, but some go on to Raffles College, Singapore, and a few to Hong Kong or English Universities." "We play all the usual games, including Rugger, and performances compare very well with efforts at home; and we still have at school the Malayan High Jump Champion, a Chinese, who raised his own record the other day to 6ft. 3½ ins.!—only 17, and no skilled coaching." They are naturally hoping to secure a larger arena for the efforts of this Other O.A's. potential world-beater. Malaya, whom Ogle has met, are John Emmett (1932) (Sungei Tawar Rubber Estate, Kuala Ketil, Kedili, S.S.) and J. E. A. Clark (1919) who has a public appointment as a Municipal Accountant in Georgetown, Penang. All these three O.A's. are in the local section of the Volunteers, Clark being 2nd in command.

P. Hedger (1932) has gone up to Pembroke College, Oxford.

Alan Beaton (1936), now at Peterhouse, Cambridge, has had his College Exhibition doubly supplemented, first by the Surrey Education Authority with a Major Scholarship of £100 p.a. for three years, and again, on the return of his family to Scotland, by the Glasgow Education Authority with an After-school Bursary of £40 p.a. He was rowing last term in the Peterhouse 1st boat.
