RUGBY FOOTBALL, 1945

Thanks to a back division which, with or exception, was the same as that which finished la season so strongly, we went off 'with a bang scoring 101 points to 17 in our first three matche This fine record caused the Nomads to send the strongest team against us, and we sustained heavy defeat: the XV struggled gamely again greater weight and experience. Our first mate with Radley, which we eventually won 14though the scores were level until ten minute from the end, revealed a lack of cohesion amor the forwards in the loose. This weakness persiste and prevented the XV from fully exploiting i powers of attack in later matches. In spite various experiments the forwards remained rathe a group of individual players than a united pacl with the result that there was a lack of shove a the tight scrums, and much wasted effort in th loose. Promising rushes, usually by one or other of last year's forwards, died out for lack of suppor whilst the opposing forwards' advances were no checked in the early stages by a coherent form: tion, but allowed to develop and get out of hand

All the same, we usually triumphed in the end through the attacking powers of the outside supported by such forwards as Green (M. J.) an Sansom. The halves, Jamieson and Beattie, mac use of every opportunity to attack, and the three quarter line achieved a good standard of combine play with plenty of thrust of an orthodox type, bu with insufficient penetrating power in the centre The defence of the backs was good enough to cor with any attack that was not both swiftly-movir and clever; against such, the reluctance of th three-quarters to move up rapidly in defence wa a fatal weakness, as was seen in the match wit Magdalen College School. At full-back Sims wa very reliable and cool, and his steadiness inspire confidence.

In conclusion it may be said that this year's X was distinctly above the average, but would hav been considerably better if the forwards had eveloped the ability to work together as a pacl so as to give the outsides more scope for the talents.

T. W. Green (Colours, 1944). Captain. A skill-d and determined hooker; always well up in the lose, and sound in defence. His leadership was orceful and his exhortations timely and stimuting.

P. Hayter (Colours, 1944). Right-centre. Slow p get into his stride; when he does he is hard to op. Tackling and kicking very sound. Not yet sufficiently constructive player.

A. J. Sansom (Colours, 1944). Forward. An ntiring worker in tight and loose. Backs up well ud tackles with determination and certainty. Ias more than fulfilled the promise of last season.

P. R. Sims (Colours, 1944). A very reliable layer upon whom much responsibility has rested. Its safe hands, good kicking, and tackling were a reat help and comfort to the team.

A. J. Walters (Colours, 1944). Right-wing. ast and elusive, though apt to turn in when he would go for the corner. Tactical kicking well onceived. Place kicking fairly good. Defence ot always sound.

I. J. M. Jamieson (Colours, 1944). Scrum-half. hard-worker who varies his game cleverly. His ong passes are a great asset. Always cool and sourceful.

P. R. Betterton (Colours, 1945). Played at lefting and left-centre. Has improved steadily and neat and effective. When moved to the centre e supplied the constructive play previously lacking there. Handles and tackles well.

L. A. Lewis (Colours, 1945). At left-centre he in strongly but often passed too late or too urriedly, and lacked penetrating power. On the ing he showed pace and determination. Tackles and and well.

M. J. Green (Colours, 1945). A really first-class inger in defence and attack, he also dribbles the

ball with exceptional control, and handles well. Can tackle well on occasion.

D. Beattie (Colours, 1945). Stand-off half. A constructive player who has learned to swerve and cut through judiciously. His tactical kicking is sound and he has improved his tackling latterly.

G. L. Sanders (Colours, 1945). Forward. Has improved with experience, but seems unable to play right through a match without easing-up. Uses his height well in line-outs; apt to hold on to the ball too long.

A. B. Beadle (2nd Colours, 1944). A keen forward who keeps up well and does effective work in the loose; with more experience he should be very useful.

P. A. F. Smith (2nd Colours, 1945). Forward. Speedy and promising, he is inclined at present towards opportunism rather than solid hard work. Tackling and kicking show promise. Should pass the ball out instead of running across the field.

J. B. H. J. Aldiss (2nd Colours, 1945). Forward. Rather clumsy at present, but plays a bustling game and shoves well in tight scrums. Handicapped by inexperience. Tackling unreliable.

D. M. Cullen (2nd Colours, 1945). Forward. Lively in the loose, but lacks weight and experience. Tackling fair.

J. Wake. A temperamental player who did not justify his inclusion in the earlier matches. With his height and weight, backed up by more experience and determination, he should become a very useful forward.

1st XV Matches

v. Southfield School (home). Won, 43-3.

Hayter opened the scoring after ten minutes, and Walters converted. Hayter soon followed this up with another try after a good passing movement with all the threequarters, and further unconverted tries were added by Lewis, Hayter (2), and M. J. Green before half-time when the score was 20-0. Southfield were more in our half in the second half, but were unable to stop Jamieson (2), Lewis, Sims, Hayter, and Walters (2) scoring more good tries. Sims converted one of these. Southfield's only try was the result of an interception by Haynes. The game was remarkable for our inability to kick goals.

v. City of Oxford School (home). Won, 33-8.

Our threequarters again played a large part in our victory and they were nobly supported by the pack, which worked very hard throughout. Oxford took the lead early on through Osborn, but soon after we went ahead as a result of Beattie scoring and Walters converting. We then settled down and Walters, M. J. Green, and Hayter increased the lead with tries, the last of which Sims converted. In the second half Oxford scored their other points with a try by Phelps converted by Dodson, whereas ours consisted of four tries by Betterton, two of which were converted by Sims, who also kicked a penalty goal.

v. Oxford Exiles (home). Won, 25-6.

After being in arrears twice in the first quarter of an hour, we eventually won a good game fairly conclusively. The Exiles scored first through Manthorpe after a long forward 'take,' five minutes later Betterton equalized, but Powell put the visitors ahead again. Just before half-time Hayter scored and gave Walters an easy convert. At the change-over we led 8-6. In the second half our pack got together and played really well, although it was constantly beaten in the lineouts. Hayter scored two tries and Platnauer one, while Walters converted one of these and kicked two excellent penalties.

v. Oxfordshire Nomads (home). Lost, 8-39.

In this match we suffered our first defeat at the hands of a heavier and much more experienced team; but we by no means disgraced ourselves. We were quickly behind as a result of a converted try by their left-winger, but Sansom narrowed the margin by touching down after an interception by H. J. Green. Soon after this weight began to tell and before halftime the Nomads' score reached 18. The second half was largely a repetition of the first, with the Nomads' pack overpowering ours and their outsides moving well, despite good tackling by our defence. Hayter scored our other try after a solo run of forty yards and Walters made it a goal.

v. Radley College 2nd XV (home). Won, 14-5.

Although we did not play as well as in the previous match, we won, due to persistent attacking in the latter part of the second half. The only scoring in the first half was a try by Hayter, converted by Walters, in the tenth minute. Radley pressed hard for the rest of the half but were unable to score. A high wind prevented good threequarter movements in the second half, and most of the play was restricted to the scrum. Radley equalized from an interception by Walker which Parsons converted, but we attacked hard an added three tries through Sansom, Walters, and Hay ter before the end.

v. Magdalen College School (away). Lost 0-31.

We were handicapped by losing H. J. Green an Betterton just before the match, but Barrett an Weston proved worthy substitutes. were far superior in the back division—their fly-ha being outstanding. They also won most of the tigh scrums, but we were definitely the better in the loos At half-time we were 17 down. For the first twent minutes of the second half we attacked and most of the play was in our opponents' half. After this, howeve they resumed their former ascendancy.

v. Pembroke College (away). Won, 21-13.

Play was not up to the standard of our previou matches, probably because of the wet and somewhat uneven ground. The scrum had a very poor day being too individualistic. On the other hand the three quarters were good, especially Beattie, at fly-half and the left wing. We had most of the play in th first half and scored through Betterton, Lewis, an Beattie (tries), and Walters (2 converts), while Pen broke replied with tries by Butler and Jones. Th second half was more even and at one time the resu was in doubt. However, we rallied, and scored a try b Betterton, and a try by Hayter, converted by Walter Jones added a drop goal and a try for the College.

v. Radley College 2nd XV (away). Won, 13-3.

Our pack played a very large part in winning us th. match. The threequarters ran well, but their passin went astray too often. Our opponents were unluck to lose a wing forward early on, but nevertheless the gave us a hard fight. We led 3-0 at half-time, due to try by Hayter after a passing movement right acros the field. We were hard pressed on resumption, bu stood up to it well, and eventually we took the pla down to the other end of the field where Walters score a goal. Dorey scored their only try after one of ou kicks had been charged down, and right on 'no-side Hayter touched down for us, for Walters to convert.

v. Oxfordshire Nomads (home). Won, 20-12.

Our success in this match was largely due to the fin play of Hayter who scored four tries. The game couleasily be divided up into three distinct periods. Th first was when we started off well and built up a lead of 11 points, the second when the Nomads settle down and narrowed the margin to 11-9, and the third when we rallied from a serious situation and for quarter of an hour played as a team inspired. Rangoon (continued from previous issue)

Eventually, after several days at sea, we arrived very late on May 1st at a position a few miles from the mouth of Rangoon River, where we anchored. But within an hour or two we had weighed, formed up, and the great adventure had begun. The wind had dropped but the heavy rain beat relentlessly down on our drenched selves and decks. Soon after weighing

we went to Action Stations. Slowly the groups we through the darkness. Suddenly from a nearby leade came the quiet voice of the gunnery officer over t loud hailer: 'Stand by for M.T.B. attacks.' Brid and guns crews tensed, striving to catch a glimp of the fast moving hulls of these swiftly pouncing enemies. Nothing happened; we relaxed a little Dawn was slow in coming, trying to break through the low hanging, murky clouds as thick as those that if an English November sky. Rain and more rain. We were opposite Elephant Point, with all its hidd menace, as the light filtered into the sky. And st no sign of the Jap. Those paratroops must had one a good job!

And then through the clouds came the heavies the R.A.F. with their escorts of fighters darting arour them. We watched them lumber across the sky ar as they reached their targets their huge bellies digorged bomb after bomb upon the gun sites below As they fell, before even the sound of the explosion reached us, we could see the blast waves shimmering around the targets, like heat waves enveloping the horizon on a hot summer day, as the bomb structure home. Then from the centre of the explosion hustabs of vivid yellow flame flared against the blauprising smoke.

After the heavies came the dive bombers, racin down the skies in a hurtling dive that ended in screaming upward surge as the pilots lifted their flyin bullets back again into the safer regions of the upp sky.

Their bombs made smaller explosions amid the earth-shattering roar of those from the heavier Surely nothing could remain alive after their inferrof noise, flame and smoke!

All this time we were threading our way up rive And then the mouth of the Chaung appeared, narrow gap in the river bank. Against the opposi bank and astern of us, we could see the other for wending their way. But, as we turned to enter the creek, everything else faded from our minds exce the immediate prospect of what lay ahead. We we right on our toes.

Suddenly the craft ahead opened fire on swift moving objects on the south bank of the Chaung ar immediately our gunners joined in. A crackle of sma arms fire from the opposite bank brought the remaiing guns into action firing rapidly into some nativ huts. When the guns finished there was no furth movement from the shore. Ahead of us, the rocket-carrying fighters were busily rafeing our landing beaches with cannon fire, and ckets that streamed down from their planes leaving path of smoke behind.

In went the first assault craft meeting with no position, followed rapidly by the second waves, tops pouring on to the beach immediately the craft uched down. Then it was our turn. A ninety grees turn to port, the kedge anchor rattled out tern, a quick gathering of momentum as the engine volutions increased and we hit the beach fair and uare. And we stayed there, although the heavy rrent ripping at our stern tautened the kedge re into a bar of steel. Over the ramps scrambled e troops, rapidly, without hitch, some of them glad be off with the feel of solid ground under their et again. And still no sign of the enemy.

A sudden explosion to port, an up-gouting of smoke d mud, made us duck quickly below the comparace safety of the bridge screen, thinking as we dived at at last the shelling had started. And accurately o, with a straddle from the first salvo. But it was ly our own demolition parties clearing the rear of e beach.

With troops clear, we kedged off, and the initial sault had been successfully accomplished.
