



## **Felicity's Farewell**

As my final weeks at Abingdon have drawn to a close, I have felt moments of real sadness. Abingdon gets under the skin, but the time has come to hand on the mantle and open the door to whatever comes next, for me personally, and the School. I can, however, look back on six happy, vibrant and successful years where so much has been achieved for the boys, thanks to the team effort of my colleagues and governors.

There have been many highlights.
Inspection reports have been glowing and the record number of boys who want to come here, and the very strong school roll, are clear indications of Abingdon's success and popularity. The Other Half, with some 130 activities and clubs, continues to be as extensive as it is exciting and diverse. It is what the boys do, achieve, explore and enjoy which really counts, and the list of boys' highlights is quite extraordinary. They lead very busy, productive lives and achieve remarkable things and I pay tribute to them all.

It has been a wonderful adventure being part of the lives of so many young people, and my time at Abingdon over the past six years has been the greatest privilege for me. My guiding mantra underpinning every decision I've made during my time here has been "what is best for these boys?" – and at my first assembly in September 2010, I told the

boys that I wanted them to have the best possible education. I also encouraged them to ask questions and not be afraid to take risks. I said that we were rather cramped for space and that I'd want to do something about that ... So much has been achieved since then. The governors have embraced the need to move on, from endorsing the end of Saturday morning lessons, to agreeing an ambitious programme to enhance and develop exciting new facilities. We've even introduced football as a mainstream sport!

We can see the impact of these decisions on our lives but what is less obvious are the many steps taken to encourage greater awareness of boys' mental health, and the importance of understanding how significant emotional wellbeing is, on how we live and enjoy our lives.

My hope for every boy who enters
Abingdon is that he will leave as an adult who is secure in his own skin; that he is accepting of who he is and that he will want, to the very core of his being, to make a positive difference, wherever life takes him.

Much is made of the privilege an independent school education bestows on these fortunate young people. This doesn't, however, just happen; the boys who attend this school do so not because of some lucky random stroke of

fate. No – they are here because of the hard work, commitment and aspiration of their parents and families who want their sons to aspire, achieve and become ambitious for themselves and, eventually, others. They are here because of the talent, intelligence and dedication of their teachers and all those who work here supporting Common Room in their endeavours.

I have been fortunate in my fantastic Senior Leadership Team: gifted individuals who have helped me to make things happen. My ambition and vision for Abingdon as set out in 2010 has been realised thanks to the commitment of governors, colleagues, Old Abingdonians, the boys and their parents. I have asked questions, lots of questions, and I have taken risks.

My challenge for all Abingdonians remains unchanged. Ask questions, take risks.

Above all, be kind and nice to others, even when it's really hard!

I have grown to love Abingdon and I've been happy here. I wish you all the brightest of Abingdon futures, happiness and enjoyment of life, wherever your path takes you.

#### Speaking about this year's results, **Felicity Lusk said:**

"This set of A level results sees almost 40% of the boys gaining A\* or A grades in three or more subjects and complements the wide-ranging achievements of a talented year group. Their enthusiasm to seize the many opportunities available to them and their determination to work hard to achieve the best they can will ensure they have a very bright future ahead.

At GCSE the results were outstanding. This year group exceeded the record set in 2015 for the percentage of passes receiving A\* and A grades, at a magnificent 87.3%. 22 boys gained ten or more A\* grades and 82 boys, nearly half of the year group, received all their GCSE passes at A\* or A. There is real strength across all subjects. Chemistry and Physics see over two thirds of boys with the top A\* grade, as do Spanish and Latin. All boys take English, English Literature and Maths and

the results were once again excellent with 107, 104 and 109 A\* grades respectively and of the 179 boys taking Maths iGCSE all received grades A\* to B.

This year's A level and GCSE results illustrate that Abingdon does what it sets out to do very well - to provide the best in all aspects of education. This year students have reached the national finals of the Royal Society of Chemistry's Top of the Bench competition, the Institute of Financial Services Student Investor Challenge, the Institute of Charted Accountants National Business Game, BASE, the Air Squadron Trophy competition and the UK Young Enterprise competition.


Individuals have won a number of prestigious awards ranging from the inaugural Young Walter Scott Prize at the Borders Book Festival, an Organ Scholarship to St John's College Cambridge, the Sir John Thomson

Memorial Sword and the De Havilland Medal for a member of the CCF and Oxford University's National French Film competition.

Abingdon's sporting reputation goes from strength to strength. In the international arena, boys represented their country at hockey, rugby, fencing, kayaking, triathlon and windsurfing and rowers competed for Great Britain and England this summer. One of the joint Heads of School broke the World Record for indoor rowing 5000m and numerous boys play at county and regional level across all sports.

It is the seizing of opportunity and the determination to do their best that makes Abingdonians stand out. It has been my privilege to watch these students embrace all that is on offer at Abingdon and to see them mature as they have moved up the school. I wish them every success as they take the next step."



# **Leavers 2016 - We wish you well**







# **Making the Most of Sixth Form**

#### **Broadening Horizons**



As a sixth form student at Abingdon, there's a lot more to life than A Levels. We provide a stellar academic education but we believe just as much in the importance of broadening horizons and preparing for life beyond school. We have specialist career advisors, a university applications team and a wide range of initiatives to help students decide on their next step, including funding for travel plans, work place internships and plenty of opportunities to study interests outside of A Level specifications.

Our sixth formers are encouraged to take on responsibility, to think for themselves and to develop as independent learners in preparation for moving on. We appreciate that this doesn't happen overnight and some students take longer than others so we manage the process, giving increased responsibility and freedom to boys as they earn it through their lower sixth year. Students are encouraged to take up leadership opportunities, both within school and through activities such as the Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme and CCF. They can sail, canoe or walk expeditions as part of DofE; our CCF cadets are recognised as some of the best in the country and our sportsmen have recently captained national teams in hockey and rugby as well as represented their country in a wide range of sports from rowing to rifle shooting.

Students with an interest in drama can take part in major senior school productions, or develop animation, film and documentary skills through our renowned Film Unit. Musicians have numerous orchestras, ensembles and bands to choose from and in recent years boys have gone on to become classical musicians as well as members of the more contemporary Foals and Radiohead. Most years we offer around 25 A Level subjects and subject combinations are geared around what individuals want to study not what fits into our timetable. We encourage students to take on the Extended Project Qualification (EPQ) in order to develop university research skills and either deepen their subject knowledge or broaden their interests. The topic is entirely their choice. The academic curriculum is complemented by a varied enrichment programme including lectures, discussion groups and practical workshops, and wide ranging trips in the UK and abroad.



The majority of students get to their first choice of university, usually Russell Group, and 10-15% receive offers from Oxford and Cambridge each year. The range of subjects they study reflects the very diverse nature of our sixth formers. Recently boys who have not chosen to follow the university path have opted to study music at the Royal Academy, Drama at RADA or pursue sporting careers. Each year a number of students will go to university abroad, particularly the USA, and we have specialist advisors to provide guidance in these applications.

At our open day on 1 October we are running a sixth form forum in the Science Centre. The Head of Sixth Form, Nick O'Doherty and his team will be there.

# **A Great Start to Life**

**Abingdon's Boarding Enrichment Programme** 

A new initiative has begun in our boarding community with the aim of preparing boys for "life beyond boarding". Not quite as ambitious as it sounds, the boarding enrichment programme concentrates on mastering everyday tasks, delving into issues and lessons that are more often learnt in the home setting.

#### Life after Boarding

On Tuesday nights, when there is no chapel, boys from all years are engaged in the new programme run by the Assistant Boarding Housemasters. The third year boys, who are the youngest boarding recruits, are encouraged to try new things, to appreciate the environment in which they live and to learn to get on with one another. Over the course of the Lent term, Sodexo, our school catering company, ran a healthy eating class followed by a blind taste test, where boys confused salmon with chicken and cauliflower and potato soup with leek! Clearly some way to go with acquiring culinary tastes. Over subsequent weeks boys were shown how to clean and iron by their matrons.

#### **Internet Charter**

The Fourth and Fifth Years, under the guidance of Mr Barnes, have been exploring the new digital world. In many cases the boys are far more versed in gaming and social media than the staff, and we feel it is of utmost importance that boys take responsibility for how they behave online. It is their world, and they must understand how to interact with it. Together with Mr Barnes the boys have created an Internet Charter for the boarding community and will be going on to look at social media and gaming management.

#### Responsibility

The Sixth Form enrichment programme focuses on preparing boys for their 'next step'. As most boys head towards university, they must be able to take responsibility for their own personal administration as well as their academic and social lives. To this end, Ms Elmore has been addressing the complexities of UK taxes and applying for student loans as well as making sure boys are aware of UK laws and expectations outside of the safety net provided by Abingdon School. As well as the complicated and serious nature of laws and taxes there is also the home comforts that are so important to making that next step. By the end of the Sixth Form, boys will have created an Abingdon Boarding Cookbook, to be bound and handed to every leaver, full of some of the favourite recipes from each house that can easily be made in university accommodation.

#### Life Skills

The aim of the enrichment programme is to prepare the boys for life outside Abingdon and to smooth the transition to looking after themselves. We teach them the basics of organising their daily lives; simple tasks such as ironing a shirt, cooking supper, cleaning, understanding your student loan – all of which can be taught at home but are often over-looked in a boarding environment. We want Abingdon boarders to flourish once they leave the School and our aim with the boarding enrichment programme is to facilitate the change.

### **Theatrical Abingdonians**

Teachers love seeing students do well, whether at school or beyond, so I was especially chipper as I embarked on a recent trip to London for a day of theatre involving current and former Abingdonians.

The day began at the Sam Wanamaker Playhouse on Bankside. Situated in the shadow of Shakespeare's Globe, this beautiful indoor venue was the stage for Southwark Youth Theatre's Romeo and Juliet featuring 1st year pupil Avery Trotter. The cast of 37 performed with gusto and imagination on a bare stage under simple lighting, Avery featuring prominently as the larger-than-life character of the Nurse in what was one of several bold 'reverse gender' castings. I wonder where this talented young man will end up.

Much the same thought followed my first meeting in 1997 with Simon Evans (OA). Like Avery, Simon was a young man blessed with talent, energy and determination. He studied at Cambridge before embarking on a career as a director. As I headed to the Southwark Playhouse for the matinee of his production of A Midsummer Night's Dream, I enjoyed a keen sense of symmetry; Simon's first theatrical outing at Abingdon had been in the same play. This was his fourth London production in as many months - each one lauded with four and five star reviews. His version of the Dream featured another former Theatre Studies pupil - Lucy Eaton - who was one of the early pioneers of Abingdon's successful theatrical collaboration with St Helen's.

The day ended at the Hampstead Theatre with the first public preview of Wild, the latest piece by award-winning playwright Mike Bartlett (OA). Mike was in Abingdon's first mixed A-Level Theatre Studies class. He originally wanted to be a director, but began writing plays instead. His breakthrough came in 2007 with My Child at the Royal Court. Since then, he's produced no fewer than 13 plays and television dramas, including King Charles III and Doctor Foster. Like all his plays, Wild is strikingly thoughtful, entertaining and inventive. At least one stage direction defies the bounds of science and imagination by requiring a character to "burst" like a balloon.



What connects these three theatrical Abingdonians beyond their shared school heritage? Perhaps a capacity for bold action. Just as successful drama requires characters who do things, so, it seems to me, Abingdonians who thrive are those with a determination to act on their enthusiasms. Long may they and their active impulses flourish.







#### **Abingdon** Music

### **Solo Competition – Junior Category**





### New Transfer Process to Abingdon School

Almost two decades after Abingdon Prep joined with Abingdon School to form the Abingdon Foundation, the Prep and Senior Schools are now so closely aligned that we are streamlining the process whereby boys transfer from the Prep to the Senior School. This change is a reflection of the excellent continuous education we can offer across the Abingdon Foundation. The majority of pupils at the Prep School will now receive an offer of a place for Year 9 at Abingdon School at the end of Year 5 at Abingdon Prep. For these pupils there will be no pre-test and the offer is not dependent on performance at Common Entrance, hence an end to the double testing that was previously in place and that is still a requirement for boys from other prep schools. This offer will be based on the continuous assessment of each pupil and is conditional on the pupil maintaining his profile of achievement in Years 6 to 8 at Abingdon Prep.



#### **Young Artists**

Boys of all ages worked throughout the year to get ready for Oxfordshire Artweeks in May. The School looked amazing with a vast array of stunning Art and CDT displays. In clubs, lessons and at home the boys created pieces from materials including clay, acrylic, wood and textiles. The boys in Year 5 were particularly proud of their ceramic cakes, which could easily be mistaken for the real thing.

Twenty-five of the School's young artists also exhibited their work at the Ashmolean Museum as part of the county's Young Art Oxford schools competition.




