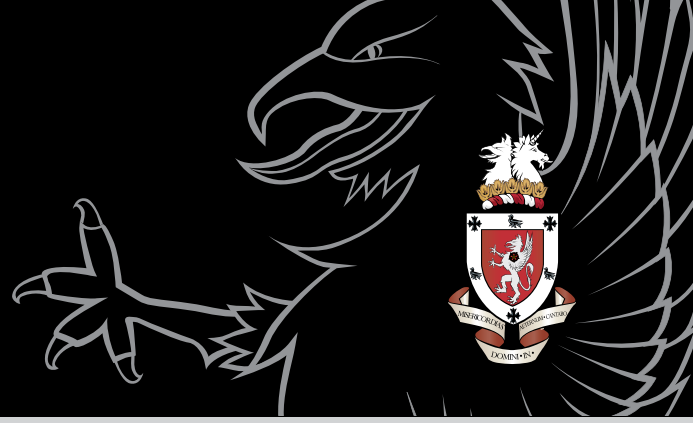

Congratulations!



Congratulations to all last summer's exam candidates – and to all those who taught them – on their impressive results. This year, a record 80% of all GCSE passes were at grades A* and A whilst 96% of all A level passes were at grades A to C and five Chemistry candidates scored marks that put them within the board's top 10. Special congratulations to Howard Loh who

achieved in one sitting a record 7 A grades at A level, to Kevin Cheung and Leonid Ganins who gained 6, and to Alex Muir and Geoffrey Penington who were awarded 12 A* at GCSE together with two grade As at AS level. All this whilst the boys continue to compete, participate and perform at the highest level in a whole variety of other activities.

On Top of the World!

Abingdonians in Moldova

During the summer holiday, pupils from Abingdon and Our Lady's went to Ialoveni in Moldova to help the charity *Agape* fulfil its mission to 'transform lives and communities' in that impoverished Eastern European country.



The team organised activities – crafts, games and sports – taught English and set up a branch of the Abingdon Film Unit.

The Headmaster, Mark Turner, saw *Agape's* work for himself when he visited the Ialoveni Gymnasium last May. He was inspired by both the love of learning and the joy in living that he found at the school.



Activity Challenges

A group of Second years, on a team-building visit to Brecon in April, spent their time canoeing, caving, climbing, abseiling, gorge scrambling and mountain walking, as well as problem solving and orienteering. Although team building might have been the stated aim of the exercise, huge confidence building has been one of its main results.

Harry, who has received two gold *Crest* awards and also won gold at the British Chemistry Olympiad, won a bronze medal in Vietnam. In the same month, John Morgan, a fellow *Crest* award winner representing Great Britain at the 40th International Chemistry Olympiad in Budapest, won a silver medal.

The Arts at Abingdon – Summer 2008



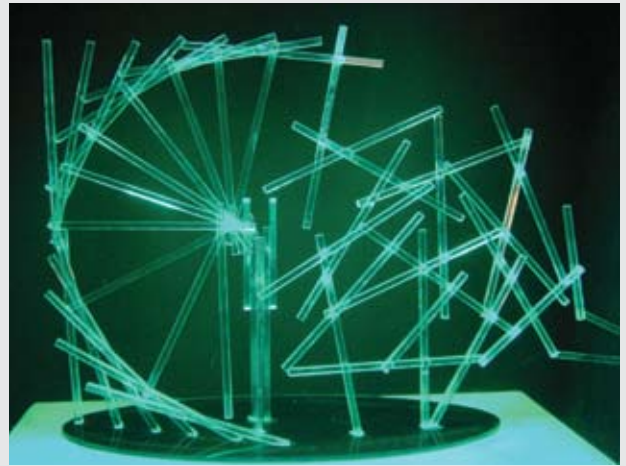
A level artists exhibited their examination work in the Arts Centre at the end of May.

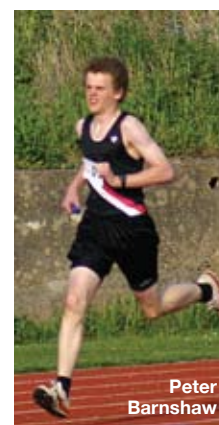

Athletics

On a sunny evening in May, the upper years of the Prep School descended on the Amey Theatre to demonstrate their musical ingenuity and interests in the Summer Concert. The concert provided a platform for individual performance, ensembles and whole class work.

The evening was opened by the Jazz band, led by Simon Currie, with a superb rendition of *Mercy, Mercy, Mercy* by Joe Zawinul. Other notable performances followed with the string group and then the choir performing exceptionally well with an arrangement of *All I Have To Do Is Dream*, which included a solo by Christopher Young. The evening provided an opportunity to showcase some of Abingdon Preparatory School's finest musicians.

Years 5 & 6 Science and Technology Day

On 13 June the Oxford Trust visited School to run a Science and Technology day. The aim of the day was to enable the boys to explore and understand scientific concepts in an exciting way. We were lucky to have two science and engineering ambassadors from local industry to help. The morning was spent investigating forces and air resistance with parachutes. This culminated in an egg drop challenge where pupils had to design protective gear for eggs that were then dropped from the first floor music room window. Record success followed with 9 out of 14 eggs surviving the fall.

The afternoon challenge was fairground engineering with the focus on forces and structures. The boys designed and built a fair ground ride from *KNEX* and were complemented on their imaginative and original designs.

Cricket Roundup

All teams had a slow start to the season, but, like the weather, things picked up.

The 1st XI is a young, talented side, but it took a few games for them to gel as a team. They enjoyed several close matches, and a thumping victory over New College. There were many highlights for players in the other senior teams. The pick of these were Josh Perry and Dan Torrance's century opening stand against Abingdon School, Luke Teh's 5 for 9 against St Hugh's, Freddie Craik's 67 against Pinewood and Peter Moore's fine 58, not out, against St Hugh's.



The Colts A team also has a number of very talented younger players. The team notched up victories against Pinewood and Davenies, and were frustratingly close in what might be regarded as 'winning draws'! There were notable individual performances in all the Colts' teams, including Jonathan Bibby's hatrick against Davenies, Alexander Turner's 5 for 5 against Chandlings, and Colts A captain Will Bull's match-winning 52 against Pinewood.

Year 8 trip to Normandy.

Sunday 15 June saw some excited boys setting off for France on the overnight ferry to Caen. Despite little sleep they were up and ready for a rendez-vous at a snail farm at 9am. Snails were everywhere - about 500,000 of them in fact! A tasting session followed and the smell of garlic soon enveloped everyone.

Next on the agenda was a trip to Mont St Michel and a walk round the Abbey. It's hard work climbing all those steps! The boys had a guided tour around William the Conqueror's castle in Falaise which confirmed all that their history had taught them.

The five day tour included a trip to the D-Day landing site at Arromanches, the Bayeux Tapestry and Cathedral. There was a walk around the British Cemetery (over 4500 headstones) which is just outside the town. Some of those who died in battle were only 3 or 4 years older than our Year 8 boys who found the experience very moving. As well as the educational parts of the trip there was time to go swimming, play on the beach, go shopping and sample the delights of French pâtisseries. A good time was had by all.



Sports Day



Sports Day again took place under sunny skies. The boys, dressed in their house colours, were keen to demonstrate their athletic abilities in front of a large gallery of onlookers.

Events included the pre-prep 'sandbag' race, high-jump, long-jump, cricket ball throw, shot-put, accuracy throw and various track events culminating in the house relay races.

The U9, U11 and U13 Victor Ludorum Trophies were won by Precious Aduwa-Emovan, Will Bull and Georgie Craik respectively, with the overall house cup going to Dragon.

60 Years of Development

As we prepare to open our superb new Sports Centre, it is interesting to see just how much the School has grown over the past 60 years. The black and white photograph was taken in 1938 when there were 164 boys at the School – which, as the headmaster William Grundy reported to the Governors, was the highest number the School had ever reached.

Today there are 850 boys at the School, which now owns War Memorial Field at the top of the photograph and the four houses that can be seen in Park Crescent. There is an Arts Centre on what was once the Lacies Court orchard and classrooms on its tennis court, a science block on the School's vegetable garden and a teaching block on the site of the former council offices in Bath Street.



Sir James Cobban Bursary

Issue Number 1 of the Abingdon News, back in January 2003, announced that the first boy to hold a Sir James Cobban Bursary had joined the School in September 2001. Now, seven years later, the boy has left – to read Classics at university, which is something that would have pleased Sir James a great deal since that was his own subject.

The Sir James Cobban Bursary was initially established by a group of OAs of the 1960s in memory of their former headmaster who died in 1999.

In 2010 the School plan to celebrate the centenary of Sir James Cobban's birth on 14 September 1910 – further details will be announced nearer the time.



Out of the Past

And Finally

At last, after two editions of the *Abingdon News* have looked at the subject of boy-produced publications, the archives now have a copy of the first edition of *Organ*, sent to us by William Chislett, OA 1969. The magazine, published by a group of senior pupils from Abingdon's six secondary schools – both independent and state – achieved a certain amount of notoriety by being banned in all six schools, news of which was reported in the pages of the *Guardian*, the *Daily Mirror* and the *Daily Mail* on 6 December 1968.

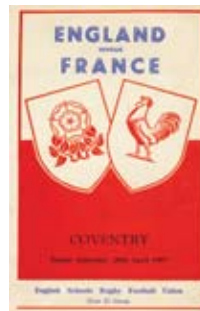


John Buckland – Schoolboy International

Among a number of items that have recently been lent to the archives is a scrapbook covering the rugby career of John Buckland, OA 1957.

John, who captained the Abingdon 1st XV in 1956, was selected to play for the English Schools' Over 15 team against both France and Wales in April 1957. Whilst doing his National Service he represented RAF Innsworth and Home Command and later played for Gloucester. John died in 2002 but it is pleasing to be able to report that his grandson will be joining the School this September.

Who, What, When, Where?

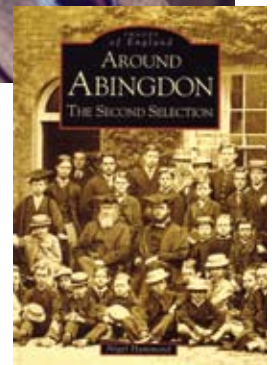

Olympic OAs



Robin Bourne-Taylor, OA 1999 (right), represented Team GB in the men's pairs at the Beijing Olympics. With the Olympics over, Robin, a Second Lieutenant in the Life Guards, will return to his regiment, currently serving in Afghanistan.

David Tanner, OA 1966, performance director of British rowing, has been responsible for the most successful rowing squad in British Olympic history. The squad won two gold, two silver and two bronze medals.

Dr David Champion, OA 1997, is the lead author of the paper *An Eccentric Binary Millisecond Pulsar in the Galactic Plane*, published recently in *Science*. The pulsar, J1903+0327, was discovered using the Arecibo radio telescope in Puerto Rico and challenges conventional pulsar evolution theory.

David, who read Physics and Astrophysics at Bristol, studied for his PhD at the Jodrell Bank Observatory. He is currently at the Australia Telescope National Facility working for the CSIRO on the Parkes Pulsar Timing Array project.



New Novel from Paul Vlitos

Every Day is Like Sunday by Paul Vlitos, OA 1997, published by Orion on 4 September, is a comic novel about the adventures of a young teacher in the mid-1990s. Paul, who read English at Bristol, spent three years at Tohoku University in Japan lecturing on English language and literature. He now lives and works in Edinburgh. Paul's first novel, *Welcome to the Working Week*, was published in 2007.

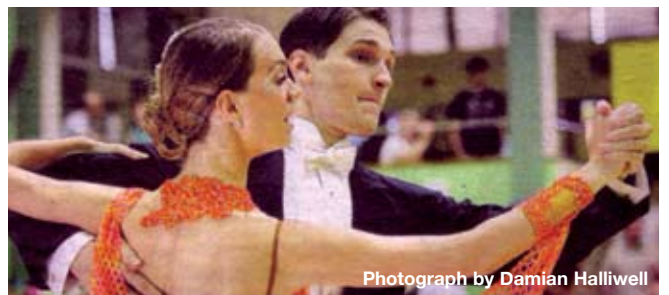
James Rose
