Congratulations to Michael and also to Ethan McLellan who has succeeded to the next round of the HSBC Road to Wimbledon, the biggest junior tournament in British tennis.

100 rowers made the trip to the Olympic Course at Dorney for the National Schools' Regatta. Racing in a new format the boys all rowed well and learnt a lot about racing at the top level. Among the many highlights, there were excellent performances from the J14s, the 1- VIII who were second in the B final and for the 2nd VIII who were fourth in the A final.
