Dear Parents, Colleagues, Governors and Boys of Abingdon,

The academic year has drawn to a close after a very full and busy summer term.

A number of teaching staff are moving on to pastures new at the end of this term.

Nearly 20 years ago Jo Willis-Bund came to Abingdon to do her long PGCE placement, and for this last year she has been helpfully teaching part-time in the English department. This followed a stint at Reigate Grammar. Colleagues look forward to seeing her in the years ahead as she continues her association with Abingdon as a parent.

When Ed Swanwick returned to the UK from running a boarding house in Australia, he quickly set about working closely with Mark Hindley to ensure we were ready for the forthcoming ISI inspection. Together with the other boarding housemasters and his team of tutors, he helped ensure that the recent inspection had such a positive outcome. He has been committed to rugby as a senior coach. significantly the quality of the coaching offered to boys, and the breadth of sports they can play. We see this throughout the year, notably in the Lent term with huge numbers of boys representing the School at hockey, rowing and football as well as in other areas. We have been privileged to be involved in supporting the charity "Blue Skye Thinking" which Andrew and Sally set up in memory of their son Skye. I wish Andrew and his family all the best for the move to Dean Close where he is to be Deputy Head: Operations and Co-curricular.

Finally we say farewell to Alison Quick, who worked with me at Oxford High, and who was here when I arrived six years ago. Working part-time - always a tough call for those involved in the all-consuming world of drama - we have all much enjoyed the fruits of her creativity and drive, melding together the talents of Abingdon boys and St Helen's girls. We wish her well in her retirement.

Many congratulations to third year student, Joe Bradley, on winning the prestigious Young Walter Scott Prize in its inaugural year. Joe collected his £500 travel grant at the Borders Book Festival where he enjoyed a weekend meeting well know writers. Joe's story, A Most Unusual Childhood, is set in China during the Boxer Rebellion and features a family of English Missionaries. It is based on Joe's own great-grandparents. What a tremendous achievement.

Our highly successful Young Enterprise team, Wabi-Sabi, took part in the national final of the competition this week. At the time of writing they are still competing so I wish them luck and very well done for the their tremendous performance in the competition to date.

Eleven lower sixth economists have had their entries to the Deloitte Sixth Form Essay Competition selected as finalists from hundreds of entries across the region. Congratulations to all the boys.

Middle school students Jason Ng, James Hogge and David Bunn all received distinctions in the Maths Olympiad with James and David gaining scores in the top 100 in the country, very impressive indeed.

In recent weeks, boys have been walking, kayaking and canoeing as part of the DofE Award Scheme. These are very tough challenges and I am always impressed by the number of our students who participate. Eleven fifth year boys undertook their very rigorous Day Skipper sailing qualification, sailing for a week out of Plymouth, again a very impressive achievement.

In other activities, boarders gave up a Saturday to help paint and decorate Long Furlong Primary School. The boys answered a call for volunteers from Long Furlong's Head who very much appreciated all their endeavours. Third year boarders also enjoyed a trip to Bristol, visiting the at-Bristol interactive science museum and undertaking a spot of shopping.

Following the referendum, 18 lower sixth economics and business students visited London's Silicon Roundabout, Tech City and the Bank of England's Education Centre. The potential impact of BREXIT was much discussed. Sixth form physicists also took part in an all-party parliamentary debate on the future and developments in artificial intelligence at The House of Commons.

Third and fourth year students learning Chinese Mandarin visited the BFI to learn about the history of mainland China's cinematography including the impact of political and social changes. Mandarin students also enjoyed an unusual workshop with a British Rock Band, famous for their Chinese Music in Asia. Boys practised their Chinese by writing songs with their own Chinese lyrics.

The Lower School has been savouring the end of term with a range of sporting, musical and cultural events. Trips included Hampton Court, where the boys learnt about life at the Tudor Court, and in an action packed, long weekend in Rhineland, they practised their German whilst sightseeing and absorbing German culture. First year students enjoyed a visit to Fishbourne Roman Palace where they explored the site and took part in a workshop looking at Roman artefacts. The Second Years had a hugely popular end of term treat when BMX Halfpipe World Champion, Mike Mullen, held a BMX workshop, kindly financed by the Annual Fund. Lower School musicians impressed audiences at their School Gala concert and the Junior Solo Competition. Congratulations to David Bicarregui who won the latter with a flute sonata by Walckiers.

Michael Stinton, Abingdon's Director of Music, says that 2016 has been one of the School's largest and most gifted musical years with some outstanding instrumentalists and singers. It was lovely to hear many of these talented boys at the year's musical finale at the Sheldonian last week. It was a superb concert with some stunning performances, particularly by our senior soloists, James Anderson-Besant (harpsichord), Leon Wu (piano) and, from the Fifth Year, Robert MacLennan (xylophone). I greatly appreciated the contribution from the Joint Chamber Choir singing two New Zealand Maori farewell songs. Tom Keogh was a fine soloist and the Maori pronunciation was perfect. Thank you.

Another end of term highlight has been the annual Griffen Ball where 450 boys, parents and friends had a fantastic evening, despite the weather at what was a very happy occasion. 70 local Abingdon residents attended the Summer Term Community Tea party, where boys entertained with quizzes and music recitals and played host to a lovely strawberries and cream tea.

The weather has not helped the cricket season this term but there have been some high points. The U15s were crowned county champions and went on to the regional final where they defeated Reading School. Two days later, a trip to Frocester for the last 16 unfortunately resulted in a loss to Millfield on a very wet wicket. This is the furthest an Abingdon U15 team has progressed in the competition. The U14s also reached the final of the County Cup. The 1st XI has had a year of rebuilding, giving young players excellent experience at a high level. Although results have not always been kind the future is looking good for Abingdon Cricket.

At Henley the boys competed well with the 1st VIII having a good win against Norwich before losing to the finalists St Paul's. In the Fawley Challenge, the quad won against King's Worcester and Maidenhead before going out to the eventual winners, Claires Court. Trials for the Great Britain Junior Squad are under way and we wish our rowers well.

The Athletics Club has had a very successful season culminating in a good performance at Marlborough College where both the Juniors and Intermediates came second out of seven schools. The Tennis Club has had a good term with wins against St Edward's, Magdalen College and Stowe, amongst others. The U13 and U15 teams have both won all their fixtures in the county stage of the Aegon competition. In the Old Abingdonians versus the School annual fixture the OAs secured the win in what was a close encounter and as always, a thoroughly enjoyable afternoon.

There were excellent results at the Oxfordshire County Shooting Championships with Drew Farwell winning the junior trophy and James Magé the Class D winner. In addition, there was a team win for James Hogge, Anthony Yang and James Magé in the Symonds Bowl.

David Bunn continues to excel at orienteering with an excellent performance at the British Sprint Championships. Also impressive was Harry Baston-Hall, who despite being only 14, managed to get a bronze medal at the British Cadet Fencing Championships in the under 17 national competition.

Many of you will be aware that last week Crispin Hyde-Dunn, our Headmaster at Abingdon Prep School, was appointed to the Headship of the Dragon School Oxford, from September 2017. I would like to congratulate Crispin on this tremendous achievement.

Over the last week of term and the summer holidays many boys and staff will be involved in trips out. The myriad of activities include RAF summer camp and CCF adventure training camp, DofE walking in Glencoe, ESSA finals in Birmingham, sailing in Greece, a field trip to India and an expedition to Vietnam. We also welcome our Moldovan partners to school next week. I hope everyone makes the most of these superb opportunities.

May I take this opportunity to thank everyone for the very happy time I've spent at Abingdon over the past six years. It has been the most enormous privilege to be Head of Abingdon. The School is blessed with talented, committed teachers and support staff, the wise stewardship of our Governors, supportive parents and, of course, all our boys. Abingdon is in very good heart indeed, thanks to the contribution and hard work of so many individuals. Thank you, and I wish you all the best wherever life takes you.
