First Year Recommendations

- 1. The Extinction Trials S.M. Wilson: It's a land of monsters both human and reptile. The only chance of surviving is to enter a contest more dangerous than anyone can imagine. Stormchaser and Lincoln will do anything to win. They can trust no-one perhaps not even each other.
- **2. Gladiator: Fight for Freedom Simon Scarrow:** Forced to train as a gladiator, young Marcus Cornelius Primus is determined to find his father's old commander, seek justice for his family and set his mother free. But Marcus is hiding a secret. If the Romans discover it, there will be no escape.
- **3.** Finding the Fox Ali Sparkes: Dax is glad to accept the offer of a place at a secret school. Now he can learn to control his shape-shifting powers. But he soon realises that the school is not all it seems, and sets out to find out who controls it and what they want from the children there.
- **4.** The Way of the Warrior Chris Bradford: August 1611. Jack Fletcher is shipwrecked off the coast of Japan, his father and the crew slaughtered by ninja pirates. Rescued by the legendary sword master Masamoto Takeshi, Jack's only hope is to become a samurai warrior. And so begins his training and his fight for survival.
- 5. Smith Leon Garfield: In the dangerous streets of 18th century London, a 12-year old pickpocket robs a man, then shortly after witnesses his murder. On the run from the killers and the police, Jack desperately seeks to clear his name and find the real killers.
- 6. The Longest Night of Charlie Noon Christopher Edge: Charlie, Dizzy and Johnny are lost in the woods. In the darkness lurk strange dangers and impossible puzzles. Having set out to find the truth of what lies at the heart of the trees, now they find themselves trapped in a nightmare that seems to have no end.
- 7. Malamander Thomas Taylor: Twelve-year-old Violet Palmer engages Herbert Lemon, Lostand-Founder at the Grand Nautilus Hotel, to find her missing parents. They discover that the disappearance might have something to do with legendary sea-monster, the Malamander...
- 8. The Hobbit J.R.R. Tolkien: Bilbo Baggins enjoys a quiet and contented life, until one day the wizard Gandalf and a band of dwarves persuade him to help them on a dangerous expedition to raid the treasure-hoard of Smaug the dragon. Bilbo's life will never to be the same again.
- **9. Who Let the Gods Out? Maz Evans:** After a shooting star crashes crashes through the roof of his shed, Elliot has to deal with the threat of an escaped death daemon and the arrival of the Olympian Gods to recapture him. It's not at all clear that they're up to the job.
- **10. Siege Chris Ryan:** A top-secret military programme is recruiting teenagers for missions where adults would attract suspicion. Will Max Johnson, desperate to win a place, make it through the gruelling selection process, when someone seems determined to prevent him?

- 1. And Then There Were None Agatha Christie: Ten strangers are lured to an island mansion. On their first night, the voice of an unseen host accuses each person of hiding a secret. Then one of them is murdered and the survivors realise the killer is among them and will strike again... and again.
- **2.** In the Shadow of Heroes Nicholas Bowling: Fourteen-year-old Cadmus has been a slave since he was a baby. Then his master, the only family he knows, is murdered, he receives a secret message, and he finds himself on a quest that will take him to the edge of the Roman Empire.
- **3.** My Family and Other Animals Gerald Durrell: Moving to the island of Corfu to escape the British weather, the Durrells find themselves sharing their new home with a variety of local wildlife, including geckos, bats, toads and scorpions much to the delight of the youngest son!
- 4. Children of Blood and Bone Tomi Adeyemi: The night that magic disappeared, everything changed for the worse. Now teenager Zelie, with the help of a rogue princess, has one chance to bring back magic and strike against the despotic monarchy. But danger lurks, within and without.
- 5. Here Lies Arthur Philip Reeve : Gwyna is just a girl when she is bound in service to Myrddin, a traveller and spinner of tales. Then Myrddin transforms her into a goddess, a boy warrior, and a spy to help him turn the leader of a raggle-taggle war-band into King Arthur, the greatest hero of all time.
- 6. The Territory Sarah Govett: England 2059 or what's left of it. Noa Blake is just another normal 15 year old with exams looming. Except in The Territory normal isn't normal. Anybody who fails the exams will be shipped off to the Wetlands, which means a life of misery, if not death.
- 7. Ender's Game Orson Scott Card: The earth is under threat of alien invasion. If humanity is to survive, the government must create the greatest military commander in history. Ender Wiggin is their last hope. But first he must survive the brutal training that will see him emerge victorious or be utterly destroyed.
- 8. Boys Don't Knit Tom Easton: After an unfortunate incident, Ben Fletcher is forced to undertake community service. To his horror he ends up in a knitting group but then it turns out that he's really good at it. If only he can stop his friends finding out.

- 5. Wool Hugh Howey: Inside a giant underground silo, men and women live a life of rules and regulations, of secrets and lies. Rule breakers are dangerous, liable to infect others with their hopes and dreams of outside. One of these people is Jules. She may well be the last.
- 6. **Ready Player One:** Wade Watts wanted only to escape his depressing reality by entering the virtual utopia of the OASIS. Now he finds himself part of a desperate race to claim the ultimate prize in a competition with terrifying real-world implications.
- **7. Fatherland Robert Harris:** It's April 1964 and Adolf Hitler is approaching his '75th birthday. A Berlin detective investigating a murder uncovers signs of a conspiracy that could go to the very top of the German Reich.
- 8. The Gifted, the Talented and Me William Sutcliffe : Sam is the only ordinary person in an extraordinary family, and absolutely fine with it until he's forced to attend the North London Academy for the Gifted and Talented, where everyone but Sam is determined to make him famous.

- 1. I Am Legend Richard Matheson: The last living man on Earth spends his days as a hunter, seeking out and killing the vampires that were once human, like him. At night he barricades himself in his home and prays for the dawn. How long can he survive?
- **2.** Flowers for Algernon Daniel Keyes: A man with an IQ of 68 has his intelligence vastly increased through experimental surgery, but being intelligent turns out to be a bitter reward, as he discovers what people really think of him.
- **3.** The Talented Mr Ripley Patricia Highsmith: Sociopath Tom Ripley is struggling to stay one step ahead of his creditors and the law, when an unexpected acquaintance offers him a free trip to Europe. It's a chance to start over and he's determined that no-one will stand in his way.
- 4. The Martian Andy Weir: He's stranded on Mars for at least two years in a habitat designed to last one month. With death by suffocation, thirst or hunger all looking extremely likely, there's only one way to survive: he's going to have to science his way out of it.
- 5. The Three-Body Problem Cixin Liu: Beijing police ask nanotech engineer Wang Miao to infiltrate a secretive cabal of scientists after a spate of inexplicable suicides. Wang's investigation will lead him to a mysterious online game and immerse him in a conspiracy that spans light-years.
- 6. Into the Wild John Krakauer: The true story of a young man who walks deep into the Alaskan wilderness and whose SOS note was found four months later. Into the wild explores the obsession which leads some people to explore the outer limits of self and leave civilization behind.
- 7. White Fang Jack London: White Fang tells the story of a young wolf-dog's journey from the wild into human territory. In the process, White Fang learns that civilisation is every bit as vicious and violent as nature and that survival is only awarded to the fittest.
- 8. How to Stop Time Matt Haig: Tom Hazard might look like an ordinary 41-year-old, but he's been alive for centuries. As long as he keeps changing his identity he can keep one step ahead of his past and stay alive. The one thing he mustn't do is fall in love.
- **9. Touching the Void Joe Simpson:** Descending from the peak of the remote Siula Grande, Simon Yates saves his own life by letting his climbing partner fall 150 feet to his death or so he thinks. But his partner survives, and begins an agonising crawl back to base camp.

- **2. Kafka on the Shore Haruki Murakami:** In a land where cats talk with people., fish tumble from the sky and a forest harbours soldiers apparently un-aged since World War II, a troubled man struggles to find the identity of both a killer and their victim.
- **3.** A Tale of Two Cities Charles Dickens: Two men, enmeshed by their love for the same woman, are drawn against their will to the vengeful, bloodstained streets of Paris at the height of the Reign of Terror and soon fall under the lethal shadow of La Guillotine.
- **4.** Half of a Yellow Sun Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie: As the horrific Biafran War erupts, a boy from a poor village, a young woman who has abandoned a life of privilege to live with her lover, and a shy English writer are drawn together and torn apart in ways they couldn't imagine.
- 5. Wolf Hall Hilary Mantel: Thomas Cromwell, a political genius with a deadly expertise in manipulating people and events, battles to defeat a self-interested parliament and keep the goodwill of King Henry VIII, whose moods fluctuate between romantic passions and murderous rage.
- 6. Wyrd Sisters Terry Pratchett: Meddling in royal politics turns out to be a lot more complicated than certain playwrights would have you believe, particularly when the blood on your hands just won't wash off and you're facing a future with knives in it.
- **7. Crime and Punishment Fyodor Dostoevsky:** In this 'psychological record of a crime', the perpetrator of a brutal double murder plays a cat and mouse game with a suspicious prosecutor, all the time struggling with his feelings of being above society's laws yet also desperate to redeem himself.
- 8. Look Who's Back Timur Vermes: Berlin, Summer, 2011. Adolf Hitler wakes up on a patch of open ground, alive and well. The world has changed, Seeking to restore his beloved Fatherland, he becomes a YouTube star, gets his own T.V. show, and people begin to listen.
