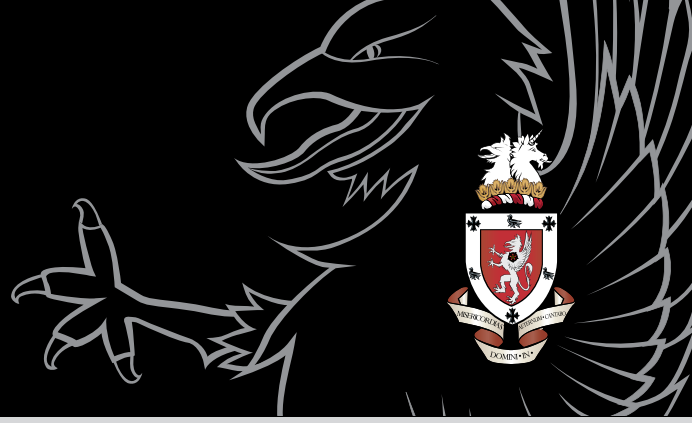

TOP MARKS!

Abingdon's 2007 A level and GCSE candidates can congratulate themselves on achieving the School's best ever results: 73% of A level passes were at Grade A and 75.7% of those at GCSE were at A* or A. These are wonderful results especially as many of these same boys have been competing, performing and taking part at the highest level in a wealth of non-academic activities whilst working for their exams.

Ruling the Waves

Ollie Cook and his brother, Jamie, arrive in Cap Griz Nez four and a half hours after leaving Dover having rowed across one of the busiest shipping channels in the world. Strong winds and high waves had twice postponed the expedition but on 10 June, despite an early mist, the brothers got underway. Their sponsored row raised nearly £6,000 for research into Motor Neurone disease from which their grandfather died ten years ago.



The A level results place the School 29th in *The Times* independent schools' exam league table, the highest performing boys' school in Oxfordshire. Among the School's star performers were nine boys who achieved five A levels at Grade A whilst Anthony Chan achieved seven. Last year only fourteen candidates in the whole country achieved this. At GCSE, two boys were awarded ten A*s whilst one, Timothy Deeks, was awarded eleven.



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Good-bye!



An era came to an end in the Chemistry Department last term when two members of staff, who between them have spent 71 years at the School, retired. Richard Coleman owed his appointment to James Cobban, headmaster 1947-1970, whereas three years later it was Eric Anderson, headmaster 1970-1975, who appointed Tom Ayling as head of the department; he was appointed Second Master of the School in 1991.

Moldovan Visit

It is usually Abingdon that goes to Moldova over the summer holidays but this year a small party of fourteen Moldovan children came to Abingdon. They stayed in Waste Court, took lessons in the classrooms and made a number of visits to places of interest. Abingdon has had links with Moldova, through the charity AGAPE, since 2000 and has raised more than £25,000 in an effort to help young Moldovans raise their country from its position as one of the poorest in Europe.



Olympiad Champions

Recent successes at the British Physics and Mathematical Olympiads have seen a gold medal awarded for physics at GCSE level to Ian Houlby and one at A level to Clive So, the latter award confirms Clive as one of the top fifty physicists of his age group. Geoff Pennington, third in his age group at the Mathematical Olympiad, has been invited to attend a summer school for especially gifted mathematicians.

Experiencing the Past

Civil War Weapons

Pikes were awkward and unwieldy weapons as these First and Second Year boys in the History Club discovered when they attempted to reconstruct a Civil War encounter between pikemen. Even though their pikes, at 8 feet, were only half the usual length and about a third the thickness, the boys could appreciate how effective these weapons could be against horsemen.



First World War Battlefields

Another war, two centuries later, was brought to life for these Third and Fourth Year boys when they visited the battlefields of Ypres and the Somme over the Easter holidays. Through a series of briefings, held at a number of significant locations, the boys were able to appreciate the reality of this terrible warfare.

Shadowing the Carnegie

Pupils from Abingdon's six secondary schools judged for themselves which of the shortlisted books should win the prestigious Carnegie Medal for children's fiction. At their joint convention, held at John Mason School, they chose *A Swift Pure Cry* by Siobhan Dowd. In the event, the London judges chose *Just in Case* by Meg Rosoff.





Ten Tors

The event itself is quite enough of a challenge – a two-day totally self-sufficient 35, 45 or 55 mile hike, depending on age, across Dartmoor between ten nominated tors – without the weather joining in. This year it was the weather that won and after weeks and months of training the appalling conditions forced the abandonment of the event after 24 hours.

Adventure Trips

Osmington Bay

A group of fifty-three First-year boys enjoyed five days of teambuilding and problem-solving activities at Osmington Bay in Dorset over the Easter holidays. Among the activities were abseiling, quad-biking, the high ropes and the zip-wire.

Forty Second-year boys enjoyed an adventurous week at the outdoor education centre near Brecon in April, canoeing, caving, gorge scrambling and walking in the Black Mountains.



London Olympics

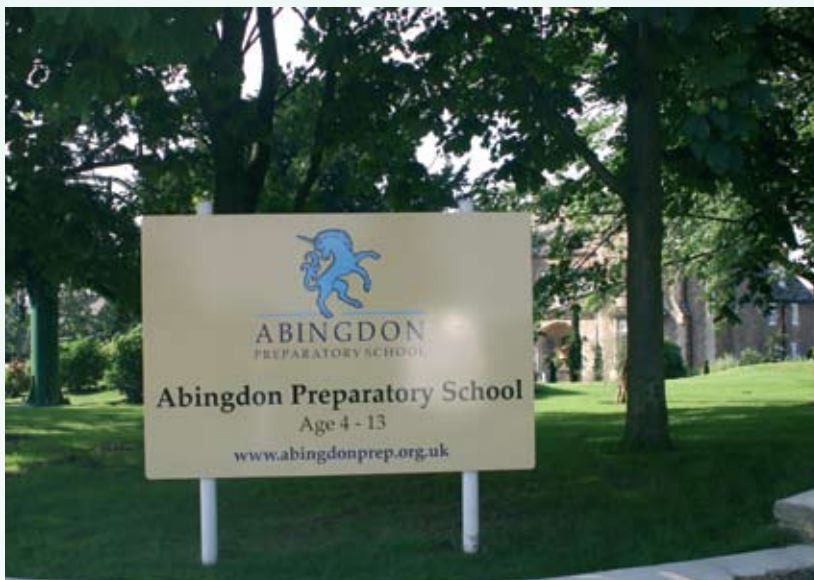

Athletics

The revived Athletics Club ended the season with two county champions in its midst – Tom Foxon and Michael Summers. The Club managed to enter three teams in competitions at Radley, where Tom Foxon set a School Junior Javelin record, and Harrow, where Alex Muir set a School 800m record. Following an exceptionally rainy competition at Marlborough, Alex Muir now holds the Inter-School record for the 400m, 800m and 1,500m.



A New Name for a New Era



September 2007 heralds a new era for the School as the building development is completed and it takes on the title, Abingdon Preparatory School. The name Josca's remains an important part of the Prep School and will be retained by the Josca's Old Boys Association and the main school building, which will be known as Josca's House.

The Preparatory School's new facilities include a sports hall, changing rooms, classrooms and an art room. The development cost around £3 million and will enable the School to expand to take 250 pupils. The new buildings will be formally opened on Saturday 29th September.



The Excitement of Science

The University of Oxford saw four boys from Year 8 come second in the University Challenge section of the Salters' Festival of Chemistry Competition on 12 June. Such success reflects the huge enthusiasm for Science that there is at the School, as can be seen by the enjoyment the Pre-Prep Department got from a visit by The Oxford Trust on Discovering Materials who showed them how to make, amongst other things, balloon rockets, marble mazes and slime.



A Musical Summer

Among the seven hundred musicians taking part in the Festival Concert, South Parks, Oxford on 13 May, were a Year 7 group who formed part of a 250-strong choir of children from schools across Oxfordshire. They performed John Mole's *Circus Songs*, set to music for the occasion by John Madden.

Music by composers from around the world, including some by Abingdon Prep's own talented staff, was performed at the School's Summer Concert in which over 170 pupils played an active part.



Summer Away-Days

A visit to the American Museum in Bath was just one of a number of day and residential trips made by the School last term. Other visits took place to the Roald Dahl Museum; Warwick Castle; the Botanical Gardens, Oxford; Cotswold Wildlife Park; Christ Church Cathedral; The Living Rainforest; Chedworth Roman Villa; Sulgrave Manor; Roves Farm and Hooke Court.

Common Entrance Success

Abingdon Prep's Year 8 pupils achieved the highest grades ever attained by the School in Common Entrance examinations this year. All boys who applied to Abingdon were awarded either a place or a scholarship including the Young and Summers Scholarship. All twenty-nine pupils who sat Common Entrance gained places at their target schools and scholarships to four other leading independent schools were also won.



National Prep Schools' Art Exhibition

A seascape by Michael Bicarregui, Year 6, is the first piece of art to have been submitted by Abingdon Preparatory School to the annual SATIPS Art Exhibition, which was held this year at Bute House Preparatory School, Hammersmith. The exhibition was opened by the wild life artist, David Shepherd.



Cricketing Triumphs

Despite losing an unusually high number of games to the weather, this cricket season goes down as one of the most successful. Captain Will Bibby led the 1st XI by example, scoring heavily in a season in which the team only lost two of their nine games. The majority of games resulted in wins with the 1st XI, 3rd XI and Colts B XI being the most successful teams overall.

The Abingdon Foundation Development Fund

From its origins as a school for the sons of officials at Abingdon Abbey, Abingdon School has survived, grown and flourished due largely to the generosity of benefactors.

The Past, Present and Future

Abbot John de Blosneville

The earliest recorded benefactor was Abbot **John de Blosneville** and last year the School celebrated the 750th anniversary of the establishment in 1256 of his endowment for the support of thirteen poor scholars.

John Roysse

The Dissolution of Abingdon Abbey in 1538 created great financial uncertainty. Fortunately, in 1563 a wealthy Old Abingdonian, **John Roysse**, gave money for the building of a new schoolroom and endowed the School with property in Birch Lane in the City of London.



Thomas Tesdale

Another wealthy Old Abingdonian, **Thomas Tesdale**, left £5,000 on his death in 1610, which in 1624 led to the foundation of Pembroke College, Oxford to provide university places for boys educated at Abingdon.



Richard Cox

In recent times the School has benefited considerably from its link with the **Mercers' Company** and the name Mercers' Court is an acknowledgment of their generosity. Individuals have continued to play their part: **Ron Amey**, after whom the Amey Theatre is named, (see page 10); **John Greening**, OA 1934, whose generous donation allowed the extension to the Science Block, the Greening Wing, and **Richard Cox**, OA 1934, after whom Cox's Field at Frilford is named. Further appeals led to the Jubilee Wing (1977), Sports Hall (1983), Arts Centre (2003) and the new boathouse (2004).

In the 19th Century, **Herbert Young**, OA 1868, keen to foster the teaching of science and mathematics, funded the Young and Summers Scholarship. His co-benefactor, former headmaster **Edgar Summers**, bought Lacies Court to augment the scholarship. The First World War Memorial Appeal led to the purchase of Waste Court and its accompanying fields whilst that of the Second enabled the purchase of War Memorial Field. In the 1950s, Old Abingdonians, with the help of the mathematics master, **William Rudd**, bought the grounds of Lacies Court. In the 1960s, an appeal to commemorate the Quatercentenary of John Roysse's re-endowment raised £63,000 for a number of building projects.

The Governors have now established the Abingdon Foundation Development Fund to support both School and Preparatory School and allow the Foundation to offer opportunities to able boys, irrespective of their parent's financial means.

The newly appointed Director of Development is Jan Glover who was previously Bursar, and prior to that Vice-Chairman of the Governors, of the Manor Preparatory School.

What's in a Name?

How some of the familiar names at the School came about.

The Amey Theatre

Ron Amey, Chairman of Amey Roadstone Construction, was an active Governor of the School from 1973 to 1985, acting as project manager for the Amey Hall, Sports Hall and Warehouse projects and a vocal supporter of the creation of both a Business Studies and a CDT department. Financially he was immensely generous: in 1976, Cobban House was refurbished with money from the sale of land he had given the School, and in 1978 further donations financed a quarter of the building costs of the Amey Hall, now known as the Amey Theatre following the construction of the Arts Centre in 2003.



Sawbridge Music Scholarship

Hugh Sawbridge, Director of Music, 1954-1960, is credited with laying the foundations of the School's highly successful music department. He came to the School following distinguished service with the Durham Light Infantry in the Korean War. He died in 1997, leaving a bequest to the School for the furtherance of musical education, which became the basis of the Sawbridge Scholarship.

Ingham Music Room

John Ingham taught science at Abingdon from 1915 to 1958. A staunch Methodist, he was the choirmaster at Trinity Methodist Church in Conduit Road. At his death, he left a bequest to the School that enabled the building of the original Ingham Music School, which was replaced when the Arts Centre was built. The Ingham Music Room perpetuates his memory.

A Duxbury Tie

Duxbury ties are awarded to leavers – boys and staff – who are considered to have served the School in some understated yet significant manner, just as George Duxbury himself did. The tie was instituted in 1969 to mark the thirty-five years, 1931-1966, that he spent at the School as Classics master, Editor of *The Abingdonian*, Librarian, Archivist, OA Secretary, Secretary of the OA Trust Fund, Master-in-Charge of rowing and of the Junior Training Corps. In 1990, money collected in his memory and from a bequest he left to the School went towards the creation of the Duxbury Boarding Scholarship.



A Prince Among Rose Growers

Alfred Prince, OA 1923, was a member of a Longworth rose-growing family who were responsible for the breeding of some exquisite roses which, like many famous roses, have now been lost. Robert Mattock, the heir to what was once a rival family business, is leading a search to see whether such beauties as the *Longworth Rambler*, a vigorous red climber, can be found blooming forgotten in some Oxfordshire garden.



President's Dinner goes Italian

David Brice, OA 1961 hosted the annual President's Dinner at the School on Saturday 7 July. Over seventy guests enjoyed an Italian style menu, reflecting David's love of Italy and all things Italian. A group of this year's Upper Sixth leavers, together with girls from The School of St Helen and St Katharine, performed a cameo version of their own production *Covered in Love*, which they then took to the Edinburgh Fringe in August. The Griffen Quartet, leaving music scholars, impressed guests with the professionalism of their performance, as did Simon Evans, OA 2002, with his magic show. The bar in the Masters' Common Room proved to be a popular after-dinner venue.

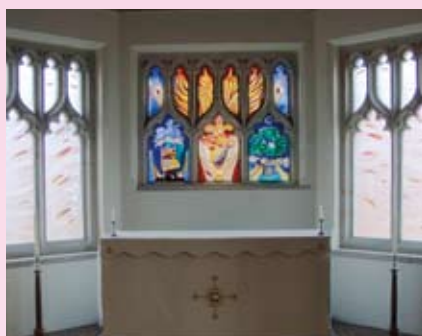

Hugh Randolph

At Evensong on 14 June, the School Chaplain, the Revd Henry Kirk, dedicated two windows to the memory of Hugh Randolph, 1936 – 2006, Membership Secretary of the OA Club and Member of Common Room 1963 – 1993. The new windows, which complete the scheme of the Trinity Window at the east end of the Chapel, were made possible by Hugh's generous bequest to the School. Members of his family were among the congregation who heard the designer of the window, Nicholas Mynheer, describe how it symbolises the embracing love of the Holy Spirit.

Hugh Randolph Prize for Local History

In Hugh's memory, the OA Club has instituted an annual prize for Local History. The first winner was twelve-year-old Guy Bud who impressed the judges with a well-researched essay on 'Abingdon Abbey during the Reformation'.
