WIN WIN a winning term

As pupils 'take their marks' for the exam season, the School can look back on a 'winning' Lent term that saw three musicians reach the finals of the National Chamber Music Festival; two mathematicians win gold in the British Mathematical Olympiad, gold for three chemists in the BA Crest Awards, and gold too for a fencer representing Great Britain in a home international. *Underground Village*, made by the School's Film Unit, won selection to the National Young Filmmakers Awards, there was a first place in the South Regional KUGB Karate Championships and the selection of eight rowers for GB trials; all this on top of an extremely successful hockey and cross-country season and the award of twenty-three provisional places at Oxford and Cambridge.



Youth Speak

No we're not talking text-messaging here but rather the Rotary Club's *YouthSpeak* Public Speaking Competition. Five teams from Abingdon School entered and a Lower School team with Luke Carter, Tom Sishton and Edmund Lewis qualified for the zone final. Fifth-former Philip Gardner's speech, 'Impossible is nothing', received particular praise as one of the finest pieces of rhetoric that the Society has heard.

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Golden Awards for Maths and Chemistry

Harry Desmond, Tim Middleton and John Morgan have won the British Association for the Advancement of Science Gold Crest Award for their investigation into the metallization of polymer surfaces. The boys' research, carried out in conjunction with the Department of Chemistry at the University of Oxford, will be of significant interest to the electronics industry. Timothy and John have places to read Natural Sciences (Physical) at Cambridge and Tim, Physics at Oxford.



In the British Mathematical Olympiad the standard is so high that most entrants manage a score of about 10 out of 60. However, Geoff Penington, in the fifth form, achieved a score of 40, which won him a silver medal. Ben Ai, with a score of 52, and Howard Loh with 59, won gold medals and were respectively 11th and 3rd in the country. Both Howard and Ben have places to read Maths at Cambridge.

Half Term in Paris

The School's biennial study trip to Paris is designed to help boys studying A level French acquire an understanding of French culture and society as a background to their course content. Fifteen sixth-formers and two members of staff took the Eurostar from St Pancras to the Gard du North where, over the next few days, they packed in visits to the city's many historical and cultural sites.



The Irish Question



In an attempt to understand the Irish Question, especially the Easter Rising of 1916 and the ensuing War of Independence, a group of sixth-form historians visited Dublin over half term. The National Museum of Ireland provided them with an introduction to Irish history in general whilst Kilmainham Gaol showed them where the leaders of the Rising had been executed. An intensive period of study at the Guinness Storehouse gave the group an in-depth understanding of the history and economics of a certain dark brown beverage.

Film Awards

Underground Village, a documentary made by two members of the School's Film Unit, Matthew Copson and Patrick Reece, has been selected to compete for a Young Filmmakers Award, part of the Leeds Young People's Film Festival. The documentary features the Annesley mining community in Nottinghamshire.



Meanwhile, *Gravel and Stones*, the Film Unit's documentary about disabled people in Cambodia, was shown at the Curzon Cinema, Shaftesbury Avenue on 1 April as part of the prestigious London International Documentary Festival.

£11,985 Raised for Charities

Over the Lent term the School raised this magnificent sum for a variety of charities:

Helen and Douglas House

A cheque for £2,050 was presented at the end of January to *Helen and Douglas House*, the local charity that provides respite and end-of-life care for children and young adults. The money was raised by parents, staff and boys who were sponsored to run in December's Bicester 10K Road Race.

The Third-Form Charities Group raised £455 from a sponsored silence and a doughnut sale for the Indian charity *Asha* and the Oxford Radcliffe Children's Hospital. *Asha* also benefited from an Own-Clothes Day that raised over £1,500 for a group of local Abingdon charities as well as for the *Afghan Connection*, a charity that targets specific projects aimed at improving the health and education of the people of Afghanistan.

The musicians raised £1,560 from their Christmas and New Year Concerts for the *Bangladesh Cyclone Appeal*, and helped to raise £5,000 from a concert at Pangbourne College for the *Children's Trust*, which supports children who have suffered life-threatening disabilities as a result of accident or illness.

Meningitis Research, SSNAP

Dan Harris, inspired by the work of the John Radcliffe's Special Care Bay Unit, which cared for a neighbour's premature twins, raised £1,150 for the charity *SSNAP* from the pantomime he wrote and directed for Franklin's House, *Willy Wonka and the Temple of Doom – A-lad-in-Trouble*. Later in the term, Lower School footballers raised over £270 for *Meningitis Research* in a charity football tournament.

RAF Section Visit

The RAF Section of the CCF paid an exhilarating visit to RAF Brize Norton last term where they saw the USAF's massive C17s – the Globemaster Transport Plane – and the RAF's VC 10s, now used as tankers. They were given experience on the VC10 simulator, the smoke simulator and elements of parachute training.



Easter Tea Party

Residents of Cygnet Court, Old Station House, Lady Eleanor Court and members of the Older and Bolder group were invited to an Easter tea party in the School at the end of last term. They were entertained



by some close-harmony singing from the *Abingdon Academics* and by the *Music in the Community* group.

The party was organized by the Upper VIth who received special thanks for their contribution to Community Service throughout their time at the School.

Sergeant Pepper's Children charted the fortunes of three generations of the Pepper family between 1914 and 1968: from Jack Pepper whose golden future was destroyed by the First World War to his grandson, an anti-war campaigner. A talented cast from the Junior Drama Club brought a sparkling production of Lionel Blair's musical *Oliver!* to the Amey Theatre at the end of February. After dreaming of food glorious food in the workhouse, Oliver is recruited into Fagin's pocket-picking gang, where his career doesn't go too well. All the boys were very impressive, not only with their rendition of the songs but also their mastery of the dance routines so that, all in all, they should consider themselves a great success.




A Winning Trio

Cross Country

Boys Go Dutch



40 boys from the Prep School enjoyed a football tour of Holland over half-term. Staying in the ominously named Badhotel in the coastal resort of Scheveningen the party arrived after an uneventful trip via Heathrow, Schiphol and The Hague.

The first fixture was under floodlights against Rava Houtwijk, who fielded three under 12 teams of varying ability. Both the Prep School's U11 teams coped admirably against the older age group, producing determined efforts but just falling short. The U12 team faced Rava's best footballers and struggled to cope with the level of skill they displayed. However, despite three defeats, the experience of playing under floodlights was one that all the boys were thrilled by.

Day two provided one of the highlights of the tour with a trip to Ajax's stadium, the Amsterdam Arena. As the pitch was due to be replaced the next day we were granted the special honour of playing on the hallowed surface. The boys' excitement was palpable and the distinction of being the first scorer became a mighty contest for all. Will Whitworth, in his quest to find space to implement his not inconsiderable skills, made the serious error of releasing Anne Parker (Head of Maths) down the right wing. With searing pace, Anne closed in on goal pursued by a baying pack of boys. Despite fluffing her first shot, she somehow managed to convince the goalkeeper to allow her to have another go. Knocking three or four ten year old boys out of the way (Anne's competitive nature is a thing of legend), she managed to beat the one legged keeper from six yards and become the first to score at the Amsterdam stadium!

After finishing our tour we were able to watch the first team training. This was a fantastic opportunity for the boys to see what professional sport is all about.

Day three mixed business with pleasure; a visit to Scheveningen Sealife Centre followed by our final fixtures. SJC Noordwijk were the opponents and the boys were suitably inspired by the previous day's excursion. The U11 B team played with great determination but couldn't contain another skilful club side. The U12's team played their best football by some way but also lost out in a well matched game. It was left to the U11 'A' team to try and chalk up a tour victory. In front of a packed crowd, the boys turned on the style and recorded a resounding win. A great way to finish!

Plans for New Chapel Windows


To celebrate the centenary of the Chapel in 2003, the School commissioned a new east window from the Oxford glass artist, Nicholas Mynheer. When Hugh Randolph died in 2006, the new glass was able to be extended as a result of his bequest to the School. Nicholas Mynheer has now designed a scheme for the whole Chapel and it is hoped that one day it will be possible to see it completed.

The Chapel has a total of ten three-light windows, three of which have already been completed: the central east window depicts the Trinity, to which the Chapel is dedicated, whilst the windows on each side extend the theme in largely uncoloured, sandblasted glass. The proposal is to have a further three coloured, pictorial windows – each window representing a term in the School year and a relevant season of the church – together with four sandblasted windows with the one nearest to the war memorials carrying references to the three armed services.

New Scholarships

Next year the School's first Drama and Sports scholars will take up their places: Joe Westcott, an Abingdon Prep School pupil, has been awarded the new drama scholarship.



All scholars, whether in sport, drama, art or music, always have to meet Abingdon's academic standards, but the extension of the awards is an acknowledgement by the School of the numerous ways in which talent can present itself. Joe has not only had leading roles in the Prep School productions but has also appeared at the Oxford Playhouse, the New Theatre and for the BBC.

Whitefield



Whitefield was bought for £17,000 in 1965 from Jack Mobbs, OA 1929, with help from the Quatercentary Appeal Fund. For many years, the ground floor was used for classrooms whilst the upper floors provided staff accommodation. Once Mercers Court was built, in 1994, the classrooms could be moved out and eventually the ground floor was let to the Unicorn School for Dyslexia. This summer, the Unicorn School will move to new premises and the ground floor will once more be used by the School, this time for much needed office space.

The house has a long association with the School having been owned by Arthur Preston, OA 1867, a long-term Governor of the School, President of the OA Club in 1903, a generous benefactor and the prime mover in the purchase and conversion of Waste Court into a boarding house in 1928.

Beverly House

Last summer, the Abingdon Foundation took the opportunity to buy Beverly House, Frilford when it came on the market. In view of the expansion of Abingdon Preparatory School, the chance to buy these premises, positioned as they are right next door to the School, seemed too good to miss. With its seven-acre garden, coach house, granary and other outbuildings, Beverly House and its grounds provides the School with valuable possibilities.

Arctic Airman

Arctic Airmen, a recent gift to the School archives, highlights the skill and endurance shown by Dennis Healy, OA 1931, during his wartime service with RAF Coastal Command. Entrusted with a series of 'most secret' high latitude reconnaissance flights between March and September 1942, his detailed record of the sea-ice edge from Iceland to north Russia during these months was not only of the highest operational value to the Russian convoys but remains a valuable comparative record of ice conditions in that year. Healy was awarded an immediate DSO for a rescue mission to Spitsbergen involving ninety-seven flying hours over a nine-day period. On 25 September 1942, whilst on the final flight of his Arctic tour of duty, Healy was the only casualty of an attack by a Ju88. He is buried in Severomorsk in the Russian Federation.



And Etc...

The article in the last issue on boy-produced newspapers stirred many memories and moved Mike Watt, OA 1961, to send the School a collection of *Octopus*, *Scum*, *Albatross*, *4th Science Times*, *The 1-X Times* and *The Gryphon*. Among the verse, match reports and 'in' jokes, their pages reflect the preoccupations of the 1950s: Malaya, Cyprus, Taiwan, Formosa and Tibet. Primarily an outlet for the School's creative talents, *Etc* dates from the late 60s, early 70s hence its preoccupations with napalm, protest marches, nuclear fallout, Trades Unions and the Common Market. We have copies of all these publications in the School archives but of *Zebra*, *Camel* and *Organ* we only have the memories of John Bowles, OA 1969, and Hugh Wilson, OA 1969. They remember articles on Tariq Ali, the Paris riots and the famous occasion when *Organ* made the front page of *The Guardian*.




Etc, cover design

End of an Era

Fred Wiggins, OA 1934, who died last autumn, was the last of the seven Wiggins brothers who attended Abingdon School. Fred served in the Royal Artillery during the Second World War and his nephew Colin Wiggins, OA 1953, has in his possession a Field Service Postcard on which Fred broke army regulations by adding three words so that the card read – *at the base in England*.

Not very exciting you might think but for the postmark – Ashford, Kent 31 May 1940. Fred was indicating to his family that he had escaped safely from Dunkirk.

Alan Wiggins, OA 1938, the youngest of the brothers, was killed when he was shot down over Belgium in 1944. Archaeologists from the Belgian Aviation History Association recently excavated the site where his plane came down and research has revealed that it was brought down by 'friendly fire' – another RAF plane.



At a recent careers evening held at the School for pupils of the three Abingdon independent schools, much interest was expressed in the City: three OAs describe their careers there so far.



Matthias Bader, OA 1999

Matthias is an analyst with corporate finance advisors *Hawkpoint*. He took Maths, Business Studies, Chemistry and History at A level and then read Computing at Imperial College. He followed this with an MSc in Advanced Computing and then a Graduate Diploma in Law. He joined the graduate training scheme at *Hawkpoint* where, two years

later, is now an Associate. He would describe his core activities as analysis and project management on a variety of corporate finance issues for companies in both the public and the private sector.

Tom Burton, OA 1997

Tom took Maths, Physics and Business Studies at A level and then studied Business Studies and Information Systems at Sheffield. After university, he joined the Corporate Finance department of *KPMG* where he spent three years and specialized in private equity funded company acquisitions. He then spent three years in corporate development before returning to the Financial Services industry when he joined *Jamieson Corporate Finance*. Here his work is concerned with institutional and private investors executing leveraged buyout transactions, fundraisings and company disposals.



Jack Wearne, OA 1998

Jack is a credit trader with *Citi*. He took Maths, English and Geography at A level and then studied for a BSc in Economics and Econometrics at Nottingham. After graduating, he worked in financial control with *Rabobank*, from where he moved to *Citi*, joining their analyst programme in 2006. Brodie Steers Oxford to Victory



Nick Brodie, OA 2004, coxed Oxford's Blue Boat to a six-length victory in the 154th Boat Race on 29 March. Following as it did three previous Boat Race defeats, two in the Isis Boat and one last year in the Blue Boat, it was a sweet moment for Nick who is President of the Boat Club this year. Whilst at Abingdon, Nick coxed the 1st VIII to their famous 'triple' in 2002: the Schools' Head of the River, the National Schools' Regatta and the Princess Elizabeth Cup at Henley Royal Regatta.

Robin Bourne-Taylor, OA 1999, President of Oxford University Boat Club in 2004-05, is a member of the British Olympic rowing squad training for this summer's games in Beijing.

Gareth Butler, OA 1982

Gareth Butler, who died of a heart attack on 29 February at the age of 42, was "one of the cleverest, most knowledgeable and likeable people in broadcasting", wrote Jon Sopel in his obituary in *The Guardian*. At the BBC, where he had worked since 1987, Gareth was admired for his ability to hold in "his head facts and figures, policy details and statistical quirks that never ceased to amaze", and for the intellectual rigour and delicate editorial judgement that he brought to all his work. Gareth had been deputy editor of *The Politics Show* since 2003 and his final programme, in January, came from the World Economics Forum in Davos where he had gone to interview the prime minister.
